

COUNTY-STATE PLANS PAVING OVER 50 MILES

Lasher Road To Be Continued To Bloomfield Hills Village

EXPECT TO END IN YEAR

One of the roads to be built by the state, the extension of the Lasher road on a new 150-foot superhighway right-of-way from the Wayne County line to Pontiac's western limits, is to be a State Trunk Lane, the upper portion of which will serve as a belt line by-pass around Pontiac and is under construction now.

Inter-County Roads

Trunk line ST will be improved from 10 miles through the village of Holly to Fenton, and surveys and detailed plans have been made from M24 for the 12 miles between Pontiac and Oxford.

In addition to these specific state projects there are several inter-county roads to be built, the State having charge of building operations as well as the determination of assessment districts. These roads are the Deerpine road, the lower seven miles between Oakland and Macomb county;

sections of the Eight Mile between Oakland and Wayne county, and four miles between Oakland and Washtenaw counties.

Perhaps the most important inter-county road will be the North-western Highway, a new road of superhighway classification that will bisect the territory between Woodward and the Grand River. Three miles of this road will be in Wayne county, in the city of Detroit for which rights of way are now being acquired. The highway will proceed across Oakland county at a diagonal for more than 27 miles and approximately 12 miles on the road, it is expected will be built next year.

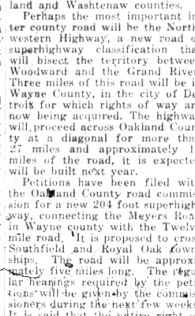
Petitions have been filed with the Oakland County road commission for a new 204-foot superhighway, connecting the Meyers Road in Wayne county with the Twelve mile road. It is proposed to cross Southfield and Royal Oak townships. The road will be approximately 170 miles long. The regular hearings required by the petitions will be given by the commission during the next few weeks. It is said that the entire right of way for this road has already been dedicated.

Connects With Hills Village

Other roads of superhighway width to be built by Oakland County will be the Lasher road a north and south thoroughfare connecting Redford with Bloomfield Hills village at the Long Lake road, the Kensington Highway 204 feet superhighway width, much of which is being surveyed with great satisfaction, will be continued from the Eleven Mile road to Big Beaver, for which continuous right of way on both sides of the street have been dedicated.

The Oakland County road commission are G. Ross Thompson, chairman, Thomas Lytle, and Luther D. Allen. Leon Belknap is the county engineer.
