4 POINTS WIN FOR BALDWIN

Basketball Squad Not Up To Usual Form In Pre-Holiday Tilt

Showing little of the ability displayed in previous practice contests, the Baldwin cagers defeated the Berkeley basketball team by a margin of four points, in the contest held in the high school gymnasium last Friday night. At the conclusion of the game the ball board read, Birmingham 15, opponents 11.

The creditable work of both teams was largely on the defensive. Although the villagers treated Berkeley's basket a great deal of time without success, the Maroon players kept the ball in the opponent's territory most of the time but failed on many tries for goals.

In the first period two field goals were scored and one foul shot was successful.
