

COVERT TELLS OF PROBATION COUNTY WORK

Says 75 Per Cent Made Better Citizens After They Receive Opportunity

GIVES FIGURES ON COST

Urging the continued cooperation of parents and teachers of the county in continuing the probation work, giving figures and statistics which show the amount of work done along this line and

having a tribute to those who have helped the system in Oakland county, Judge Frank E. Covert of London, outlined for members of the Parent-Teacher association of the Hermon School Thursday night the work done by the county welfare organization.

Because of the probation department, many of the youth saved from a life of crime, the judge believes.

"I have made it a practice to place faith in the youth who is brought before me for the first time. I tell him that if he will play fair with me I shall play fair with him. Usually the youth tries to keep their promise," the judge said.

ler, I believe it is nearing perfection at a rate that is not surpassed anywhere.

"The County welfare association sees that children who have either no homes or home environments which is not proper, are cared for. It tends to be a good influence upon youth which has

fallen into crime. It seeks to determine the cause of the youth's crime and remedy the situation rather than to send the lawbreaker to prison when he has not had a chance to be a good citizen."

Judge Covert declared figures show that in a recent year approximately \$200 to make boys, there are 12 jurors, or 4 lawyers, and that it takes several days to settle. In a divorce case, however, where the destiny, not only of the man and woman are at stake but of their children as well, a disposition is made in a few minutes.

In a criminal case, the judge commiserated the teachers for taking advantage of an opportunity to influence their pupils to be better citizens.

RULES NAMED FOR LIBRARY

Board Decides On Regulation Of Community Rooms' Use For Baldwin

At the regular meeting of the library board Thursday night rules governing the use of the community rooms on the second floor of the new library building, as there are already applications from various village groups for one or the other of the rooms.

It was decided that the rooms might be used for educational purposes without charge by any library group organized for educational or welfare purposes. They may also be used by an individual for certain special purposes, such as for a musicale, at a nominal charge.

Educational or cultural entertainments for which no charge is made may be given there but for these a fixed rental will be charged besides the regular tax, unless the affair is exempted from that tax.

The use of the rooms will be denied to any political or advertising purpose or for regular denominational services. In all cases a small charge will be made for the use of the kitchenette, and an extra charge made for janitor service if the rooms are used after library hours. The library closes at 7 o'clock.

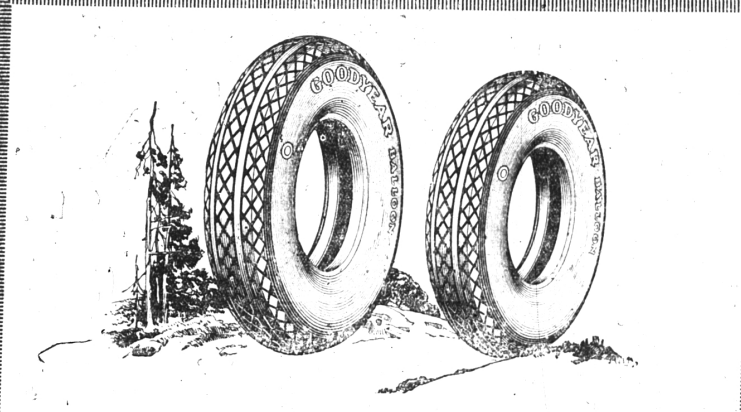
