Plans for a division of the Southeastern League into two sections are being made today following the meeting of the athletic directors and principals of the high schools, included in the group, at Ferndale high school.

The league, according to Principal Johnson, will probably be divided into two sections, with one section in the northern part of the state and the other in the southern part. A committee was appointed to study the matter and report back to the league meeting.

VLIET WARNS AUTO DRIVERS

Declares Partial Auto Ban May Be Necessary As Safety Move

A part of the general safety campaign which is being conducted in Birmingham Superintendent Clarence Vliet spoke to the Senior Association of Baldwin High School on Saturday.

Mr. Vliet, in addressing the student body, said "I do not want to see a killing, but when students are reported driving in a reckless manner, playing hit and miss on the streets of this village, and are seen traveling in the rate of 45 miles and hour in this vicinity, some drastic step must be taken to stop it."

"It is not our idea to put an immediate auto ban on this school, but when so many reports of reckless driving have been coming in something must be done. No definite plans have yet been made but there is a possibility of requiring each student who drives an auto on the campus to obtain a permit from the school authorities."

Chief James Anderson is cooperating with us by establishing a vigilance to check up and prosecute reckless drivers and thus prevent accidents.

Hart, Cooke Hear Football Mentions' Talk At Principals' Convention

Melvin C. Hart, principal of Baldwin High School and Frank M. Cooke, principal of Adams Junior High School, attended the state meeting of principals of senior and junior high schools at Lansing Thursday and Friday.

Coach Fielding H. Yost, of the University of Michigan, in the main address Thursday, discussed the program planned for the physical education at the University. He said that it would cost \$2,000,000 and that officials were depending upon the football receipts to finance it. The crowds this year exceed all expectation, he said. He feels that the victories for the University team has been so easy that defeats are not taken in the spirit that they should be.

The meeting ended Friday with a luncheon at which H. H. Ryan, principal of the University High School, Ann Arbor, was the principal speaker. He discussed the grouping of pupils according to their abilities.

Approximately 45 girls responded to the call for candidates for the girls' interclass basketball team.

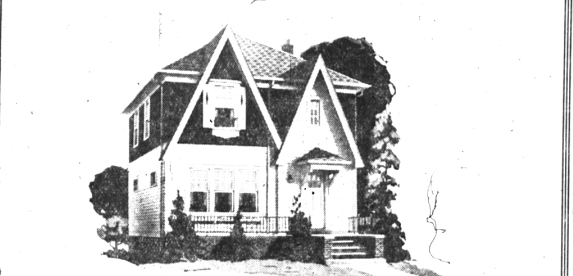


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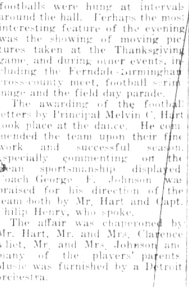
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
