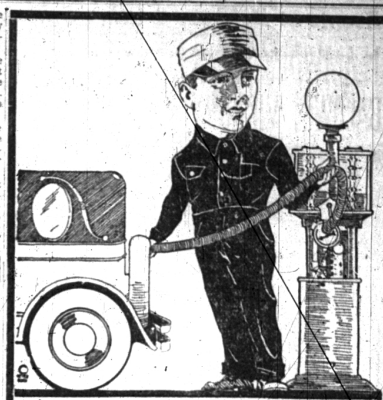
NEW TEACHERS START SEMESTER
