Former Birmingham Resident Succumbs In California Saturday

The Eastman's came to Birmingham in 1910, living on Harman avenue. Mr. Eastman kept a drug store at Milwaukee and Woodward avenues, Detroit, for more than 40 years prior to his death in 1918.

During her residence in Birmingham, Mrs. Eastman was an active member of the Women's Literary club. She was also a member of the Baptist Church. Her daughter, Mrs. Ernest Lloyd, the former Winifred Eastman, was head of the Bloomfield Hills School for some time.

Mrs. Eastman leaves, besides Mrs. Lloyd, whose home is at 2818 Espara avenue, Los Angeles, two sons, Herbert Lloyd Eastman, 2818 Moss avenue, Los Angeles, and Louis Ralph Eastman, 112 Moss avenue, Highland Park.

Burial will be at Woodmere cemetery, Detroit at 2 p. m., tomorrow.

Mrs. Loris K. Eastman, for eight years a resident of Birmingham, died Saturday in Los Angeles, Cal., from a complication of diseases. Mrs. Eastman was 79 years old.

Objections to the paving of the Ten Mile road from the Southfield road to Grand River avenue under the Covert Act will be heard at 7 p. m., Feb. 23 in the United Presbyterian Church of Southfield Township, according to announcement made today by Joe Brooks, supervisor.

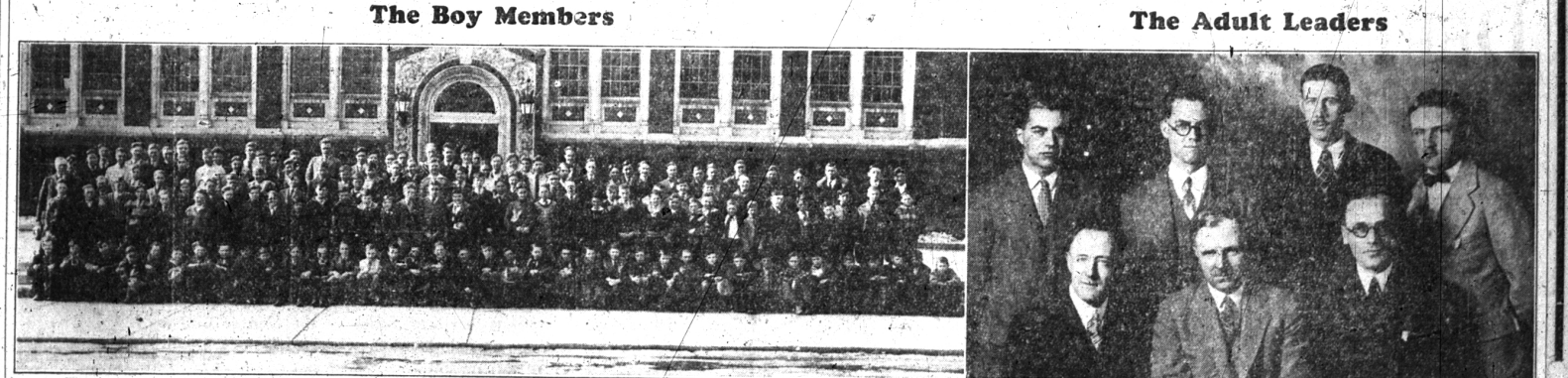
