WOMEN ARBITRATORS FOR MEXICANS

The present trouble with Mexico is an ideal opportunity for the women of the United States, according to Miss Dorothy Detzer, executive secretary of the Women's International League, who is a legal question in itself, she believes. Miss Detzer brought this statement before the members of the Birmingham branch of the league Saturday evening at the home of Mrs. John George, 11110 Lane, Southfield avenue.

"The Mexican government is perfectly willing to let United States officials carry the question to court. They believe, what is rather obvious, that our state department wants to control Mexico for her natural resources," she said.

"We are becoming more and more imperialistic in our manner to this southern neighbor of ours, and Mexican oil men are willing to allow the Mexican government to take over 41 per cent of her oil holdings within 10 years. Who are we, an outsider, to object to such a thing?"

Miss Detzer cited our strong belief in our Constitution and its right to be a free nation, and a constitution which she wants to live up to, and we are trying to have our own rights. Under the situation, Miss Detzer remarked that "Secretary Kellogg wants to see the situation."

"Of the four methods of settling international disputes, diplomacy, conciliation, arbitration and war, here is the best case for arbitration. It is the only way to settle this legal question."

Miss Detzer's talk, and the conclusion discussed a number of cases in which war would seem inevitable, and asked for her decision on them.

"War is not only wicked but wasteful, not only cruel but clumsy. It is a matter of life or death. If we keep before us the ideal of peace, we can find a peaceful settlement."
