## HEAT PASSES NET BALDWIN WINS

### Village Quintet Defeats The Tecumseh Team 34-16 In Fast Game

A perfect passing attack gave the Baldwin cagers a 34 to 16 victory over Tecumseh in a game played here last Thursday evening.

Bennett Brown, playing a stellar game at forward, was the high scorer of the contest with six baskets on his credit. Gaill and Thomas were next, each having made four goals. Arnold was high on the boards, accounting for seven of their points. The Maroon and Whites led a fast passing attack, but the Tecumseh game which spelled defeat for the down states. On their toes every minute the Baldwin men not only made use of every opportunity but showed a defense which Tecumseh could not surpass. Streb and Brown were credited with shooting in guard positions.

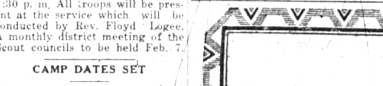
