

### TOWNSHIP INSTALLS FLASHLIGHT SYSTEM

Commendation Received On Warnings At R. Crossings in Bloomfield

Commendation is being received today by John E. Wilson, Bloomfield Township highway superintendent for the installation of two warning lights at railroad crossing which have been considered dangerous.

Flashlights have been placed at the Opdyke road and the Grand Trunk railway tracks as well as at the Square Lake road and the tracks.

The system cost the township approximately \$500, according to Mr. Wilson. There is no warning bell accompanying the lights but the model light used is said to be one of the most satisfactory on the market.

### New Bloomfield Home Completed

One of the new residences of most modern type and unusual beauty recently built in Bloomfield Hills is that of Thomas W. Tallafiero situated in Trowbridge Farms.

Mr. Tallafiero's home, which was completed Dec. 1, is of English colonial architecture and is beautifully designed. The interior is carried out with a splendid harmony of colors. The spacious living room is done in greenish blue in contrast with the dining room which is decorated in blue green. The rooms are furnished in handsome mahogany, with imported silver fixtures from Sheffield, England. The woodwork is of antique oak in the larger rooms. The kitchen is of most practical design with soundless rubber tile floors, tile walls, automatic refrigerator, electric dishwasher and many useful facilities.

Six Bedrooms  
The second and third floors are as artistically carried out as the lower rooms. These two floors include six bedrooms and four baths. The bathrooms are exquisitely finished in handsome tile.

Among the delightful features of the house is a radio and smoking room, sun parlor, breakfast room and a recreation room on the lower floor, arranged for dancing and provided with a motion picture machine.

Of special interest are the most modern scientific features, which operate automatically in almost every case. The house is heated by an oil furnace self-controlled. The temperature is controlled in each room by thermostats which regulate the heat furnished by the heater. A healthful humidity is supplied throughout, by water incased radiators. A water softener keeps both hot and cold water lines circulating with purified soft water. A cold drinking water line is included in the water system which also furnishes hot and cold rain water when it is available in the cistern. The hot water is kept at an even heat by a circulating system connected with the furnace. In addition to the furnace is another water heater which automatically goes out or is not in use. In general everything in the house is controlled by thermostat, an augustat or a pressure gauge. Rubbish is taken care of by an incinerator.

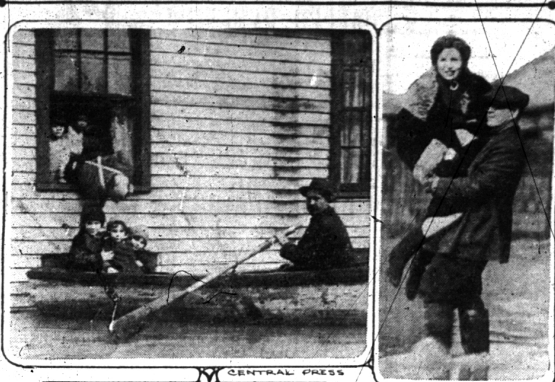
Refrigeration Plant  
Refrigeration is supplied by a sulphur dioxide plant. The laundry room will have every facility including washers, dryers, mangle and an ironer. The fruit cellar is built outside of the house underground and is regulated by thermometer.

Construction started on the new home Oct. 1, 1925.

The landscaping surrounding the residence will not be completed until spring.

About three pounds of rubber a year is yielded by an average rubber tree.
