STEWART WASHINGTON'S LETTER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—When the navy asked for three 10,000-ton cruisers, early in December, President Coolidge said: 'When a bill was introduced in Congress, later a resolution authorizing the new 10,000-ton cruisers, the president said "no limit." It looks like a pretty sudden, radical change in the presidential policy. The question whether it is really as fair as to assume anything whatever it is worth, here it is. The president is making the power together to discuss international limitation of navies. The United States was building ships at a rate to give in a short time, the strongest American navy in the world. The other countries didn't like to be outwitted, but they couldn't afford to compete with so rich a nation as this. So when Uncle Sam proposed to limit the number of his big battleships and even to make scrap metal out of several that he already had on hand, providing the others limited their programs, too, they were tickled to death. Battleship limitation was agreed on. So were various other limitations. Some of them were rather disadvantageous to the United States, but that was the American negotiator's own fault. They shouldn't have allowed themselves to be outbargained. The treaty is considered everybody's fair to have played right.
