BOARD OF EDUCATION

Birmingham, Michigan July 1, 1927
The regular meeting of the Board of Education was held in the office at 8 p. m.
Present: R. J. Coryell, Ray A. Palmer and Guy W. Jensen.
The minutes of all previous meetings since the last regular meeting were approved.
The petitions of R. J. Coryell as candidate for Trustee for three years full term, and Guy W. Jensen as a candidate for Trustee for two years to fill vacancy, and L. Virginia Hewitt as a candidate for Trustee for two years to fill vacancy, at the Annual Meeting of District No. 1 Fractional, Bloomfield, Troy, Royal Oak and Southfield, Oakland County, Michigan, were received, examined and approved and their names were entered on the official ballot to be used at said Annual Meeting which will be held in the Baldwin High School building, Birmingham, Michigan on July 11, 1927. A copy of the official ballot was ordered included in the Notice of the Annual Meeting.

Moved by Palmer supported by Jensen that the polls for the election of two trustees, one for three years full term, and one for two years to fill vacancy, shall be opened in the Baldwin High School building, Birmingham, Michigan, July 11, 1927 at 8 o'clock P. M. Central Standard Time and will be closed at 2:00 o'clock P. M. Central Standard Time. Carried.
Moved by Palmer supported by Jensen that pursuant to a resolution adopted at the annual meeting July 12, 1926, a proposition to purchase and provide free text books for all pupils in the Birmingham schools—School District No. 1 Fractional, Townships of Bloomfield, Troy, Royal Oak and Southfield, Oakland County, Michigan, shall be submitted to the voters qualified to vote upon the proposition of raising money in said district at the annual meeting July 11, 1927, and that the polls for voting on said free text book ballot shall be opened in the Baldwin High School Building, Birmingham, Michigan, July 11, 1927 at 8 o'clock P. M. Central Standard Time and will be closed at 2:00 o'clock P. M. Central Standard Time. Carried.

Further, that the District Board of School District No. 1 Fractional, Townships of Bloomfield, Troy, Royal Oak and Southfield, Oakland County, Michigan, do hereby estimate and determine that the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000) shall be raised by direct tax in 1927-28 to pay for said free text books for all pupils in said District; and further that the ballot to be used at the annual meeting July 11, 1927 to authorize the District Board of said District to purchase and provide free text books for all pupils in said District may be in substantially the following form to wit:

To authorize the District Board of School District No. 1 Fractional, Townships of Bloomfield, Troy, Royal Oak and Southfield, Oakland County, Michigan (Birmingham Public Schools) to purchase and provide free text books for the use of pupils in all grades in said District, and to authorize that \$12,000 be raised by direct tax in 1927-28 to pay for the same.

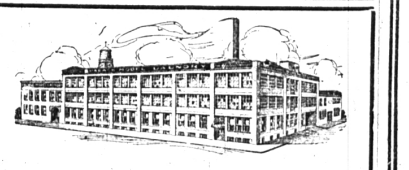
