DAVIS IS BUILDING ENGLISH TYPE INN

Being Constructed in Bloomfield Hills Village at Long Lake Road.

The third unit in the English scheme being developed at Long Lake Road and Woodward Avenue in Bloomfield Hills Village will be the Fox and Pound Inn now being erected of three facing the road of English type buildings built by W. T. Barbour, and just around the corner from the new Bloomfield Township garage. To Be Crescent Shaped

The building is being constructed in the shape of a crescent with a footage of 250 feet on Woodward Avenue, occupied by 10 English type shops. The first floor will include a dining room and kitchen with 20 places for dining on the second floor. There will also be 10 small apartments.

Construction is of brick, stone and granite with a timbered second story. A weather vane from Bury, England, showing the fox and pound will adorn one of the two tall towers.
