NEW BALDWIN PUBLIC LIBRARY ROOF TO BE OF UNIQUE DESIGN

Big slate shingles, graduated in size and variegated in coloring, are beginning to arrive for the roof of the new Baldwin Public Library being erected on Martin Street, a roof which will be unique in Birmingham. The steep sides which slope down from the high ridge pole bring the harmonious roof covering into prominence. It is expected that the work of laying the immense shingles will start next week.

The brick walls are complete with their stone base and trim and the front entrance begins to look as if one might walk in. The sweeping curves of the front eaves close a large window over the doorway and on either side of the carved sign over the door are stone carved figures in relief to represent philosophy, literature, music and art.

Expect To Raise Grade

It is expected that the grade on Martin Street will be raised as it is much lower than the Merrill Street grade. This will result in a more gradual slope from the building to the Martin Street sidewalk. The steel beams which are now exposed in the interior of the building will be plaster covered and the ceiling will be domed in sections in the same fashion as the ceiling in the lobby of the Hotel Statler in Detroit, the dome in the center running up 24 feet from the floor. This will be immediately above the delivery dock. The ceiling rooms will be slightly lower but will be two stories high across the entire front part of the building. The rear part of the building will contain two stories with the reference room and children's room on the first floor. The lecture room in the extension at the rear is above the stack room and offices.

New furniture is being considered by the library board, the most important of which will be the large delivery desk in the center. Sidney B. Thomas, the new librarian, has just returned the plans for the desk to Mrs. Retta Harr, president of the board, after studying them and making her recommendations. The order will be placed next week. Furniture will be selected to harmonize with the dark oak wood work which carries out the English scheme of architecture. The permanent location for the lecture room will probably be in three upper stories in the building.

TROY MAY ABOLISH PRIMARY CAUCUS

Pathmaster System To Go To Vote Also On September Sixth

Due to its rapid growth over the past few years, residents of Troy township are agitating several important changes in their local government. Chief of them are the abolition of the pathmaster system of road maintenance and the elimination of the primary caucus method of nominating township candidates.

Two propositions will be submitted to the voters of Troy township at a special election September 6, namely, the abolition of the primary caucus, the circulation of petitions requesting that they be placed on the ballot, according to information made known this week by Garner E. Miller, Troy township clerk.

In place of the caucus, it is proposed to have a primary election as do Royal Oak and Bloomfield townships. At the present time, public caucuses, held last spring, drew a large crowd at the Troy town hall, according to information made known this week by Garner E. Miller, Troy township clerk.

At the hearing objections and suggestions as to the method of assessment will be heard.

After the August 1 meeting, Manager Parry will prepare plans and estimates of the project, and then ask for bids on the work. Mr. Parry said yesterday that he expects to have the paving of Oak street completed before winter of this year.
