MENU HINT
If you have been steadily serving the fresh berries, you may be glad to go back for a meal or so to the old reliable standbys for a change. Fruit melange is a perfectly safe and delicious dessert to serve during the hot weather. Scalloped Potatoes with Ham, Cucumbers and Onions, Buttered Wax or String Beans, Fruit Melange.

TODAY'S RECIPES
Scalloped Potatoes and Ham—Peel and slice potatoes thin. Arrange a layer in a buttered baking dish, then a layer of uncooked, smoked ham, cut in small pieces, then another layer of potatoes, and so on until the dish is full. Season with salt and pepper. Pour hot milk over all with a good sized lump of butter dissolved in it. Sprinkle breadcrumbs on top and bake for an hour.

Fruit Melange—Cut in small pieces one slice of canned pineapple, one orange and one cup of cooked prunes, removing the stones. Mix all together, adding enough of the prune juice to moisten well. Chill and serve in cocktail glasses, garnish each with a maraschino cherry.
