dollar bills, which were bent and candy bars, cheap cigars, and peaches which Benoit purchased. Stiles where he had passed the coins at Hammel's Confectionery, above the Masonic restaurant, and Hallock's grocery store, and the Kroger store on East Maple. Sergeant Clark Green says the counterfeit money was only a poor likeness to the genuine half dollar, being of lead, quite white in color and having only faint markings. Quick work of Miss Gladys Cates, 29 years old, employee of the Gray Sweets Shop, south Woodward avenue, is given today as the immediate cause of the arrest of Benoit. Miss Cates received a half dollar from the man after making a sale and she became suspicious. Taking the coin to Eugene A. Parmenter, a teller in the First State Bank, her belief was confirmed. Police were then notified.

The man is the father of five children and, until recently, was an employee of the Ford Motor company in Highland Park. When taken to Detroit he declared to George Rogge, assistant chief of the Detroit Secret Service, that he had found a bag full of the coins and did not know that they were counterfeit.

## 91-Year-Old Man Says Hard Work Has Kept Him Youthful

**Never Mixed Voting**  
Mr. Simmons, who does not look a day over 70, maintains, "I haven't missed a chance to vote in Southfield Township or Oakland County since I was of age."  
When a boy 10 years old, Mr. Simmons describes his recreation as driving oxen to Detroit with a load of produce through dead mud roads. His recollection for such a task was blue denim overalls and a blue blouse. His overalls were rolled to above his knees and he wore barefooted. It was considered a good trip, if after strolling over the rutted road to Detroit, he could get home before dark, and before the street had been cleaned about six dollars from their vegetables.

## Lives Alone

Mrs. Charles Simmons died last March at the age of 94. Mr. Simmons said they were married 71 years before. He now lives alone and recalls the days before his wife died a little wistfully. "Although I feel a little lonely at times there is no one that I would want to live with me, I like things to suit myself," he said, and becoming national.

Mr. Simmons, is still active in the life of Southfield Burg, being one of those who have been fighting for a new bridge near the town. He knows "Henry" Ford, inviting him in a peculiar way about six years ago.

"When I first met Mr. Ford," says Mr. Simmons, "I was in the sixth corn field husking corn. I noticed a man walking through the field, he stopped and picked up an apple and came towards me. Generally he asked me how could he have the apple. I did not know who he was, but offered a better price, saying those in the orchard were what had been left after picking. Mr. Ford refused saying the one he had was good enough. I talked with him for two hours not knowing who he was. A few weeks later I met him again and he told me his name. Ford was negotiating for land along a river to build a dam and construct a plant. Mr. Simmons said.

**Ill Only Once**  
Heathly has always accompanied Mr. Simmons, except for a short time five years ago when he was ill in the hospital and not expected to live. He recovered, he said, and the doctors pronounced him perfectly sound and said he would live 25 years longer. He had drunk and smoked, he says. He drank whiskey when he was 15 years old with other children at a still in Franklin, where it was given away. He has also chewed tobacco for 45 years, but had given up the habit now he says.

**Derides Prohibition Law**  
Mr. Simmons derides the prohibition law saying it is the cause of the enormous amount of drink now going on, and the demon-

ization of the modern youth. He asserts that when liquor could be had with out trouble, none of the debaucheries of this age were carried on. "The youth of today is much worse than that of my day," he asserted, "women neither smoked nor drank in those days."

Mr. Simmons received his education at the Franklin school where his father taught in "the red school house on the brow of the hill." He went to a small high school class for three years in the old Presbyterian church which still stands in Southfield Burg. He has no children.

The tinner horn, containing flint, steel and punk was used when Mr. Simmons was a boy, he said. Matties had not been invented. He remembers threshing grain for two shillings a day.
