A woman well known in educational circles in the state of Virginia, Miss Cornelia S. Adair of Richmond, has just been elected president of the National Education Association at its recent annual convention in Seattle, Wash. She succeeds Francis B. Blair of Springfield, Ill.

Miss Adair's work in educational lines has been unique. For years she has been a grade teacher in the Richmond schools, refusing advancement because she felt she could do the most good by keeping closely in touch with the work of the grades.

She is also chairman of the educational committee of the National League of Women Voters.

Two Leaders Die

A nationally known lecturer on woman suffrage and educational problems—Miss Louise Connolly of New York and Washington—died recently. She was an authority on museum and library work.

The death in Ireland of Countess Marsefield removes one of the world's most influential and picturesque feminine leaders. She was recently elected to the Dail Eireann as a De Valera deputy but refused to take the oath of allegiance to England and was denied her seat.

WOMAN'S PLACE IN GOVERNMENT TO BE SHOWN AT CONFERENCE

Two phases of women's practical participation in government—jury service and the handling of delinquents—have been singled out for special emphasis in the afternoon program of the Citizenship Conference, July 30, being arranged by the Michigan League of Women Voters for the Farm Women's Institute, in session that week at Michigan State College.

Miss E-telle Downing, whose experience in jury service has been secured in the Washtenaw County courts at times when she was free from her duties as a professor in the State Normal College at Ypsilanti, will initiate the discussion of that subject, and Miss Ruth Thompson, judge in the probate court of Washtenaw County, and therefore in charge of a valuable professional and feminine point of view of the problems of delinquency in the rural communities.

Forms of experience and recommendations for improvement in these two vital fields of public service will later be participated in by women who are serving as jury commissioners, lawyers, who have and experience in federal, county and petty juries, on school boards, in social work.

Judge Florence Allen of Ohio Supreme Court, will be the evening speaker, developing women's responsibility to government in both local and international fields. The Citizenship Conference is open to the general public and is attracting wide interest. Arrangements for accommodations at East Lansing may be made with the College authorities or through the state headquarters of the League of Women Voters in Detroit.

Too Short
