## SCHOOL BOARD SEES INCREASE IN POPULATION

factory employment increase materially, these houses may be occupied. Then half day sessions would be held. Probably in the lower grades.

**Population Increases**  
Forty thousand dollars were added to build a grade school on the Chesterfield avenue site and for an addition to the Barnum building. The former to care for the pupils that live west of the River Rouge and probably the area west of Woodward and north of Harmon avenue.

There are now 125 grade school children in this area and building is increasing rapidly. Oak street is to be paved before a building could be completed, so the site readily accessible when school building could be constructed on that site rapidly enough to be occupied in September, 1928.

The Western street in the Quarter Lakes subdivision, Fairfax avenue last spring, Chesterfield avenue from Maple, and a school north was severed last year. While a gravelled and a good passable road yet in the spring and late fall the unsettled foundation will give away and make it impossible building operations would proceed slowly unless temporary draining was provided.

This building would contain the same rooms as the Pierce School; 12 standard class rooms, a kindergarten, combined gym and auditorium, office, showers and lockers, nurse's room and boiler room to contain one boiler and room for another to care for future addition. The building is planned so that it can be built as needed.

**To Complete School**  
The building will make a complete school with all necessary features that are now contained in the Adams School building.

The larger Barnum building is necessary to care for the grades. It must come quite soon because the present Baldwin building that is now in use is filling up rapidly. To postpone the building of a high school on the enlarged Hill site the seventh and possibly the eighth grades can be accommodated in the present Hill building for a few years. Then the pupils can go over to the Baldwin building for the vocational work such as sewing, cooking, manual training, etc. With this convenient arrangement, the interest charges, as well as the maintenance charge on this large unit, are postponed until there are enough pupils to comfortably fill a fairly large unit.

The above reason will call for the building of these two schools in the very near future and the approval by the people of the bonding for both at this time will allow the school board to build the one that will relieve the pressure with the least inconvenience to the school children. The other will follow.

The cost of these two buildings will be absorbed by the increased assessed valuations. This present year, the tax for our school was \$15.40. It was below the amount that the school board deems necessary to care for the financial school program, which amount the estimate to be between \$17 and \$18 per thousand, as was the rate for the previous two years.

The rate for the coming year will be in the latter amount, if the bond issue carries. All the school bonds are serial and the amount of the bond yearly have been planned to about \$6 per thousand valuation. This will pay for the bonds fairly rapidly and still keep the school tax below \$18 for school purposes.

**Maplecrest Site**  
Three ballots will be given you at the voting booth July 11 for school sites.  
Maplecrest. Three lots in the Maplecrest subdivision in Royal Oak township, located south of the Jewish cemetery on which is a knockdown wooden building, a well with running water in the school room, a good heater in the school room, two sanitary toilets off of the school rooms.

This site will cost \$1995 by taking a 5 per cent cash discount. The lots were rented several years ago and the building erected and a purchase clause allows us to buy it this coming fall.

The price there as elsewhere is now much higher than when the purchase option was given and should be taken advantage of. This school accommodates about 20 children that live about two miles from the nearest school building which is the Barnum school. Most of them are young and would not be able to walk nor cross Woodward avenue without protection.

The cost of housing and teaching the pupils in that building is not so much as would be in our modern buildings. The building and equipment there represents an outlay of about \$2000 and an annual rental for the past five years of \$1 per year. Now it will have to be bought for \$2000 or as may be asked must be paid.

The school building serves considerably more than 60 children. It is used for Sunday school, community singing and talks. Cash would be paid for the use of 60 per cent of the tax payers of the district vote in favor.

**Hold Option**  
Another site is a lot on the south side of Frank street just west of the Barnum building, 60x 200 feet.

and such taxes paid last winter and this coming July, being just under \$2500. This would be paid in cash and appear on the coming budget.

**Cost is \$500**  
The third site is just south of the previous one, being 50x60 feet on which the district has an option.

This tract is the east end of a deep lot facing the west side of Pierce street and can be had for \$500. It would be an asset to purchase this with the rest of the way to George street and would make the Barnum road wide enough for the running track as well as the tennis courts that are now being asked for, but are not now included as they interfere with the football and baseball field.

Also there will be a ballot to vote for free text books, as directed by a resolution at the annual meeting in July, 1926. This means that the school district will buy and distribute text books used by all students instead of the parents.

The bonds will be sold as needed and if passed now it will allow the school board to make plans for the future. The public may remember that the members of the board cannot use school funds for architectural services, buy land or for future work without a vote of the taxpayers. All this preliminary work favors the owner personally. The passing of this bond issue now for both schools will thus be an advantage and in the end will not add to their costs.

The polls of the election will be open July 11, from noon to 9 p. m. central standard time in the library of the Baldwin building. All citizens living in the district and owning property in the district that is assessed for school purposes are entitled to vote. This applies to holders of land contracts, also man and wife owning a joint deed or contract are both eligible to vote.

## Commissioners Block Fire Hall Location Again

petitioners not we believe this is enough to convince the commission that the majority of Birmingham people are in favor of the location of the fire station.

He emphasized the fact that the petitioners are not a bunch of name seekers and names secured by volunteer solicitors. The reporter invited the meeting and at one time the audience, which filled the commission chambers, heartily applauded a statement from Mr. Ellery directed at Mr. McBride. Mr. Ellery had just stated that available property could be obtained on the civic center. "We will have to pay several thousand dollars more than it is worth," said Mr. McBride. "Yes," declared Mr. Ellery quickly. "But that is a great deal less than you would ask us to pay." He referred to Mr. McBride's proposal to purchase property of Hamilton avenue for the fire station. This property is located between Woodward avenue and Park street and would cost \$29,000. This money would have to be raised by the village through a special election.

**Audience Laughs**  
Mr. Henry then declared that he believed the issue should be "thought over." It was at this point that the audience laughed out loud. Mr. Ellery said: "I am glad laughter does not bother you, Mr. Henry. It does bother me." He urged the commission to take action on a resolution he presented for the location of the fire station on "any part of the civic center."

"The commission agreed to would place the fire station on the civic center if they saw the people wanted it there," he said. "To-night you have received a petition with 473 names asking that it be placed on the civic center. We should stop playing parties and get this thing through with once and for all."

**Farmer Group Approves**  
He declared the previous commission paid for propaganda to convince the voters that the civic center was the most desirable location for the building which is to cost \$2400 and which was proved at a special election a year ago this month. Mr. Ellery warned the commission that the village is allowed but one more special election before it will be forced to leave the village without an opportunity to call on the people for an opinion in case of emergency. This is one reason we should not dare to waste the one special election allowed by law on an issue of this kind."

**Water Crisis Again**

He asked representatives present to make a motion for a vote to be taken and he would never take a responsibility that meant so much to the people of Birmingham.

Mr. McBride remained silent when President Ellery asked him on the matter. He declared that people on the street were making a great deal of noise and the commission did not have an opinion on the matter because they had not been asked for it. Mr. Corryell then declared he favored the civic center because of the fact that it would mean the people, that it would mean the fire station could be erected at the earliest possible time and be

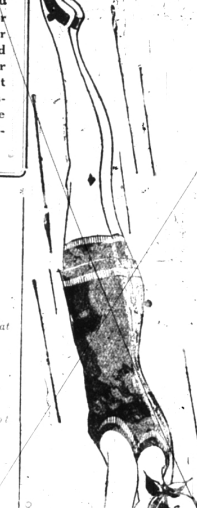
