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## MORE BIDS EXPECTED FOR MUNICIPAL SALE

Woodward And Maple Property Up For Consideration Again Next Monday.

Bids for the sale of the municipal property at Maple and Woodward avenues, most occupied by the library, police and fire stations, will be received by the village commission when members meet at the village offices Monday night.

Several more bids than were received when it was last advertised are expected Monday. The one bid rejected a month ago as inadequate was from the Bruges Commercial and Development Company of Detroit and was for \$12,000.

The proceeds from the sale will be used to erect a new village hall. The sale was approved at special election in Birmingham in March.

Frontage on Woodward avenue is 107 feet and the Maple avenue frontage is 94 feet. There are 5,721 square feet in the parcel of land.

The building as it now stands is considered almost useless to the village because of the new six-story one, now started, which will include buildings to house the department store at Woodward and Maple avenues.

(Continued from Page 1) school taxes, every citizen of the United States of the age of twenty-one years, male or female, who owns property which is assessed for school taxes in the district, and who is a resident three months next preceding such election shall be a qualified voter. Provided, that the purchaser of land on a land contract who actually pays taxes upon such land and resides thereon, may vote on question, and where husband and wife own property jointly and the same is assessed for school taxes in the school district, each may, if otherwise qualified, vote on all questions including the question of raising money.

No registration for this election will be required by the Board of Education of the Birmingham school district inasmuch as a poll book will be prepared from the records of the township supervisors of Blount, Troy, Royal Oak and Southfield of all persons qualified to vote at the above election—Paragraph 106 of the Compiled Laws, State of Michigan.

In order to obtain first-hand information regarding the necessity of the proposed bond issue committees from several local organizations have been appointed this week to investigate and report the project.

Lois Hull and George R. Averill have been appointed from the Rotary club; Otto Boer and James Martindale will represent the Real Estate Board, Seymour D. Adams and Charles A. Bingham will act for the Exchange club. It is understood that committee members from the Parent-Teacher association will also be appointed, as will several other local groups interested in the community.

According to R. J. Corvill, president of the Board of Education, a meeting of the various committees may be arranged sometime next week. At this meeting those present will obtain as much information as possible, and ask as many pertinent questions as they deem necessary, in order that the Board may be given ample opportunity to offer their reasons for the bond issue.

Many local citizens who are interested in the meeting with the Board of Education feel that, by getting first-hand information on the subject of the bond issue, they may, if satisfied of the necessity for more schools report to their clubs such information and then go out in whole-hearted manner and support the cause.

I know she must have felt during her son's trip. Her courage is typical of hers. Charles inherits it, I smile. Just a practical nurse, she says, 'that I loved him, and many, many of them I have kept in touch with, and many of them have made me proud of my work. Charles Lindbergh, of course, the shining example. It was a great joy to me to be able to write to his mother and send her my congratulations when it was known that her son had arrived safely at his destination.'

Most of Mrs. Henry's life was spent in Detroit. She had only one child, the daughter with whom she lives, and when she was 30 years old her husband died. She went to nursing because she liked it better than anything else that offered. 'As I have never regretted it, she said, 'I think it is the most wonderful work in the world.' She retired 10 years ago.

That her husband has been full one and a fine one is evident in her appearance. She has had a life which she has kept her interested in living. She has been in contact with living human beings. She has helped to save lives. She has done her work well. And she shares in the glory of Colonel Charles Lindbergh, whom she helped into this world.
