TRACKMEN TAKE CLOSE BEATING

Squeezed Out Of First, Winning Place In South-eastern Meet

After leading until the last two events, Birmingham was squeezed out of winning honors in the Southeastern league track and field meet at Ypsilanti last Saturday, by Monroe and Ferrdale. Victory in the relay for Monroe and the winning of the half mile by Ferrdale placed these teams ahead. The winning of the half mile relay meant the meeting of the Baldwinites but after running a

splendid race they were forced into second by the Monroe sprinters.

The final tally in points was Monroe and Ferrdale each 31 points and Birmingham 29 1/2. Monroe was the defending champion, having won the S. E. A. A. meet at Ypsilanti five times.

Records Fall

Several records were smashed in the meet. Zabel of Birmingham broke the record in the mile when he led the field in the time of 4:50. His time was three seconds faster than the previous record.

In winning the javelin throw Peterson from Monroe cracked the record made by himself the preceding year. His throw was over 157 feet. Bazley from Ferrdale set a new record in the half mile when he reeled off the time of 2:05.8. New marks were made in the dash and hurdles but a strong breeze prevented them from being accepted. Peterson of Monroe was the high scorer in points but after running a

the discus and javelin and third in the shot put, besides running on the winning relay team. Green of Ferrdale was second with a first in the high hurdles, second in the broad jump, and fourth in the low hurdles. Gaffill topped the point for the Birmingham scorers, placing second in the high hurdles, tie for second in the high jump, tie for third in the pole vault and running on the relay team which took a second.

Lyon Wins One

Lyon was the only one from Birmingham who made a first in the mile. His son was in the 220 yard dash. He also ran in fourth place in the century dash and in the relay team, with Gaffill, Thomson and Doherty. Kamin and Waterman both got places in the pole vault, with Kamin and Waterman tied for fourth in the javelin. Williams and Gaffill placed in a triple tie in the pole vault, with Royal Oak being the other man. Williams and Gaffill tied for second in the high jump. Neither appeared to be in top form in their usually strong event. Thomson gained a third place in the low hurdles, two places in this event going to Ferrdale.

The season has been promising to be as strong, although they will lose Gaffill, Zabel, Williams, and Waterman.

APPEAL IS MADE FOR STUDENT FUND

Campaign Is Started Among Baldwin Alumni To Help Students Through College.

The Birmingham Student Loan Fund association is campaigning today among the alumni and friends of Baldwin High School for funds for students desiring a college education, but who are without finances.

Mrs. Ruth H. Hasall, president of the organization, announces that since the association was started seven years ago about \$6,000 have been earned through money or donations by individuals or local societies. Three hundred dollars a year is the amount average to any graduate student who, in order to borrow from the fund, must be insured for an amount sufficient for security.

Seventeen high school students have used the opportunity offered by the association. The loans are started every year per cent interest after the students complete their college course. According to the association having been paid back what they have borrowed, and everything indicates that the organization is beneficial.

Baldwin Student Wins Commendation For Sculpture In New York

Eero Saarinen, of Baldwin High School, was given honorable mention in the National Soap Sculpture contest now being held in New York. Twenty-five hundred are entered in the third annual competition for prizes given by the Proctor & Gamble company.

Saarinen's soap sculpture, "The Mused Man," along with two others, were given honorable mention in the senior group of the contest. Both professionals and amateurs were allowed to enter. The contest is the largest of its kind in the world, with \$1,000 in prizes offered.

The exhibition will continue at the American gallery in New York until June 29, after which the winning models will be shown in different museums throughout the country.

Saarinen left recently for Europe where he will spend the summer. He has been active in art work at Baldwin High School and was honored twice before for his soap sculpture. His handsome wood block cuts furnished a large portion of the art in the 1927 Baldwinian annual. Saarinen is naturally inclined to drawing and much of his spare time in school is spent in making sketches of cartoons of fellow students. His plans to become an architect. His father is Elnor Saarinen, the designer of the Cranbrook church, now being erected.
