### ISLE ROYALE SEEN AS IDEAL LOCATION

Stoll Tells Of Exploration Trip To Northern Michigan Island

After an inspection of the Isle Royale in Lake Superior, Albert Stoll, conservation editor of the Detroit News and resident of Birmingham endorses it as an ideal national park.

Mr. Stoll recently told of his trip with Stephen E. Mahler, director of national parks, to the island to determine its value as a national park.


