Mrs. Harry Catherine, of Piquette street, had as her house guest over Sunday, her sister, Mrs. Josephine Moore, of St. Clair Shores.

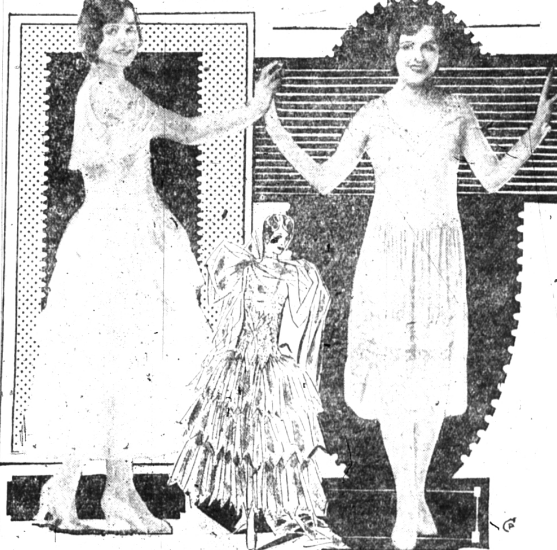
Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Ellerly, of Adams road, left Tuesday for northern Michigan, to remain until Saturday.

Lace gowns and lace trimmings are more used than almost anything else in sartorial circles this season. The dress, left above, has a small cape of silver lace falling over the shoulders, effectively trimming the organ satin bodice. Ruffles of net the same shade make the skirt and silver flowers are attached to it. Flesh colored chiffon and lace make the pretty gown (right), and it is further trimmed with pearls. The sketch (center) is of tulle, pointed and edged in crystals. The moulded bodice is accented with sequins, raiment and occasional mirror motifs.

The importance of correct breathing has of late become a recognized factor in our modern life. In most schools children are taught systematically how to inhale and exhale air while the chest expands and contracts. This is done during the exercises. Fresh air, replacing the old, stagnant air that has been allowed to accumulate, far down in the depths of the lungs, will purify the entire system, causing the blood to be purified. This must be followed by regular outdoor exercises every day, until the chest expansion of a normal woman is about three inches. To measure your chest expansion, stand all the air from the lungs and measure it with the hand. Breathe as deeply as possible and allow the tape to stretch with your own weight. Repeat this apparently lifting the chest, and the lungs fill the abdomen will expand.



A year of probation, in which to learn to bake biscuits of the proper size and weight, is granted new brides in the state of Oklahoma in a bill introduced in the state legislature by Senator Fletcher M. Johnson of Bristol. The bill provides that any person who violates this law shall be fined not less than six inches in circumference and not more than one ounce in weight when done. It exempts new brides for the year "next following their marriage." It carries with it a penalty of \$50 for violation.

MENU HINTS
The roast is the most economical piece of meat for the large family. The pot roast is, of course, the least expensive cut, but the oven roast may be economically cooked in the oven if all the rest of the meal is also prepared in it. In the following menu this has been done.
Roast Lamb
Potatoes Baked with the Meat
Asparagus on Toast
Green Salad
Strawberry Cream Cake
Coffee
COFFEE FOR FIFTY
Make coffee for approximately fifty wedding guests as follows: Put in coffee bag one pound of ground coffee, place in coffee pot or large covered kettle. Add six to eight quarts of cold water and let stand several hours or overnight. Bring to boiling point and boil three minutes. Remove bag and serve coffee as required. For after dinner coffee use four to five quarts only of cold water.
If you will find chaffon history will stand up much better if heated on the full time. This topping will serve six people. If any is left over, it will keep in a cooling dish in a cool place for several days.
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TODAY'S RECIPES
Strawberry Cream Cake—Split a sponge cake with crushed berries. Place other half of cake on top. Cover with whipped cream (one-half pint is sufficient) and place some of the largest berries at intervals on the cream. The crushed berries will need some sugar depending upon their natural sweetness.
Asparagus—Cook asparagus in boiling salted water in the oven. Drain and season with butter, pepper and salt. Serve on strips of toasted bread.

SUGGESTIONS
If you cut a plain white cake, a pound of salt is placed in the top of a double boiler and allowed to steam unobstructed for five or six minutes, it will be found that each layer is entirely separate, thoroughly cooked and fluffy. The greatest advantage of this method is that the rice can be served hot and dry directly to the serving dish from the double boiler.

WITH WOMEN OF TODAY

Although Miss Marjorie MacCreary of Cleveland, O., has written numerous plays and done newspaper work she says she prefers teaching writing to doing it herself. In consequence she is to have a special class of pupils who are talented along this line in the Cleveland city schools and will teach them journalism. About 50 pupils will be chosen from a possible 1,000.
Miss MacCreary won an advertising scholarship in 1922 from the Cleveland Advertising School. She also won a short story prize when in college, which she declares was something of a joke, as the story was French and she knew very little about the French at the time.
