Married Nine Times
Lady Ellenborough was married nine times. Her maiden name was Jane Digby. She was born in 1808. The only daughter of Lady Andover, a beauty in her own time. Lord Ellenborough was a man of affairs at which he was engaged in order to distract notice from his guardian's disreputable right worshipful nephew-in-law, wrote Eliza Stanhope sadly.

First Divorce

In 1830, Lady Ellenborough was divorced from her first husband, a son of two years, died.

Once during the years which followed, she lived in strictest secrecy, she visited her mother in England. Twelve speeding cases were tried last month, and none of the driver paid \$10 and two paid \$5 each, and two men were tried for having no tail lights.

Only one man was found guilty during the month. He was charged with running a traffic sign.
