



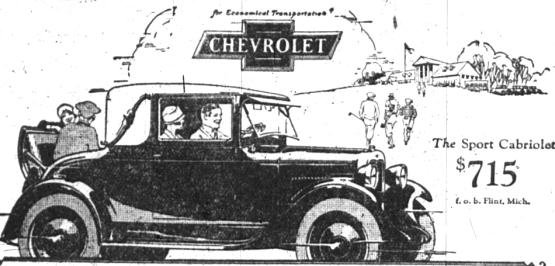
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QUALITY AT LOW COST

ATLANTA REVOLTS AT BLUE LAWS

Feels Movies Would Keep Youth Out of Harm

How Atlanta, Ga., is finding the ordinance against the showing of Sunday motion pictures a detriment to their young people and what steps they are taking to have the ordinance revoked is shown in a United Press dispatch received today in Birmingham. The dispatch is self-explanatory. It follows:

Only a year ago the people of Atlanta raised their hands in holy horror when the chamber of commerce suggested that certain amusements, notably the movies, should be allowed to operate on Sunday.

Today it was the chamber of commerce's time to gasp, for the identical suggestion came from a group of parent-teacher leaders of the city, assisted by Dr. D. Witherspoon Dodge, a Congregationalist minister. They urge it as a Christian duty.

Faces Demoralization

"Atlanta is faced with the alternative of providing clean recreation for its people on Sundays or of submitting to demoralization of many of its young people," said Mrs. M. D. Farnham, recreational chairman of the Atlanta Parent-Teacher association which, who has declared herself ready to start a drive with open movies on Sunday in view.

While Atlanta young people do not have decent amusement on the Sabbath, you cannot blame those who are turning to unhealthy pastimes," Mrs. Farnham said. "Compiled statistics show that out of 62 cities, approximately the size of Atlanta, representing 33 states, only 10 cities do not show films on Sunday. This speaks for the success of the venture."

Dr. Dodge, who championed the cause of Sunday pictures when the chamber of commerce made his suggestion last year, bases his support of the new move on the proposition that viewing clean moving pictures is no more degrading than taking automobile rides, listening to the radio or calling on friends.

"Pictures will solve a great problem here by giving people an opportunity to pass the Sunday pleasantly and in a Christian-like manner," he said.

P. T. A.'s Impressed

Mrs. A. E. Myers, president of the Samuel Inman Parent-Teachers association, was impressed with the number of young men who lounge around downtown streets on Sunday.

may be seen lounging about in quest of something to do," she said. "It is the duty of the Christian people of Atlanta to provide something, and I think the opening of theatres would be most wholesome."

At present, state and city laws prevent Sunday amusements in Atlanta, and judging from the explosion last year when the subject was broached, the majority of sentiment among the people is against it. But should the parent-teacher leaders succeed in convincing parents that their children are safer in a properly lighted theater than lounging around the streets or driving in the country, and thereby change the city ordinance, their race will not be won.

A large part of the state legislature is composed of representatives of farming districts, where a moving picture is no better than the private life of its star, and these legislators could not afford to kill themselves politically just for the sake of something to do on the week-ends when they're in Atlanta for the legislature.

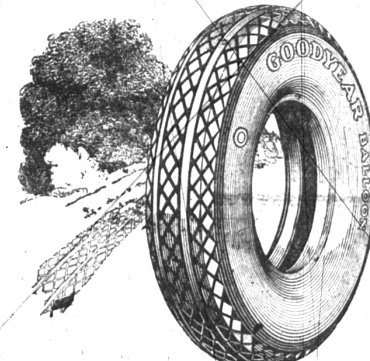
