BUILDING PERMITS ON LARGE INCREASE

Report Shows \$104,400 Expenditure in 30 Days in Village

The 13 building permits issued during February totaled \$104,400, more than twice the total for January, it was announced today. Seven of these permits were for residences, the largest one for a \$25,000 home and garage on Arlington road. It will be built by William E. Knight, Royal L. Smith, of Detroit, obtained the permit.
J. E. Barge obtained a permit for a house on Abbey road to cost \$16,000, and Mr. Smith received a permit for a \$16,000 home on Arlington road for William Henderson, 4210 Burns avenue, Detroit. Chas. Brothers are building a \$12,000 home on Dorchester road. A. D. Chandler, 2057 Burlington avenue, took a permit for a \$11,000 home on Birmingham road. Permits were obtained by J. E. Knight, R. C. Hansen, a contractor, a residence and garage on Plympton road at an approximate cost of \$10,000.

Other permits issued last month were from the First State Bank for remodeling a building on Woodward avenue to cost \$5,000; one for repairs to garage on 10th, one for an addition to an office on south Madison avenue, for \$2,000; one for a store on east 20th, and two for garages, to cost \$400 and \$500, respectively.
During the first 10 days of March, \$21,250 worth of permits were issued from the village office. Among them was a \$27,000 factory building to be built on east Benningville avenue by George M. Hart, 2111 Daines street, and W. Hart, 2111 Daines street, obtained the permit. Edward Johnson, 1327 Embury avenue, Detroit, obtained a permit for Thomas M. Faddis, 204 St. Clair avenue, Detroit, for a \$12,000 residence and garage. Paul E. Yocum has a permit for a \$250 garage on Chapin.
