HOUSEHOLD HINTS

MENU HINT
A cold moulded omelet loaf may be the piece of resistance of the Easter luncheon. It has this advantage over hot meat patties, etc., it may be made the day before and save time on the days of the luncheon. This recipe makes a good dish also for Sunday night lunch or for any meal for that matter.

Fruit Cakes
Veal, Ham or Chicken Loaf
Creamed Potatoes
Olives
Hot Buttered Rolls
Ice Cream
Cakes
Coffee.

AIR THE OVEN

After using the oven, leave it open with the inside cool. This will keep it from rusting.

TODAY'S RECIPES

Veal, Ham, Beef or Chicken Loaf—(Twenty-five servings)—Four tablespoons gelatine, two cups cold water, four cups stock (well seasoned), two onions (peeled and sliced), two stalks celery, juice of two lemons, salt to taste, four cups chopped cold cooked veal, ham, beef or chicken, two-thirds cup canned mushrooms cut in thin strips or fresh peas or green peppers may be used, one tablespoon parsley finely chopped. Soak the gelatine in cold water. Add onion and celery to stock, bring to the boiling point, cook three minutes, strain and pour over the softened gelatine. Add lemon juice, and when mixture begins to stiffen, add meat, mushrooms and chopped parsley. Turn into a brick mold, first dipped in cold water, and chill. Remove from mold and cut in slices for serving.

Grape Fruit—Here are four ways of using grapefruit for a first course. Prepare several bowls of grapefruit, cut up and fruit in half, remove core and seeds, fill space with sugar and chill. When ready to serve, add two or three machines cherries and a tablespoon of the liquid.

2. Serve each half separately with a small amount of grapefruit. Machines cherries may be placed all around the edge or halved green and red grapes may be used.

3. Remove pulp, sweeten and serve in tall glasses with cognac.

4. Remove pulp; use equal parts of orange pulp; use equal quantities of grapefruit and orange halves. Sweeten to taste. Add machines cherries and serve in tall glasses.

HAVE YOU AN OVEN CLOTH?

All good housekeepers have several hot dish holders near the kitchen range but they are usually small and not practical for oven use.

For this purpose cut lengthwise 12x30 inches. Double it lengthwise, thus giving you a six-inch strip. This will enable you to hold both sides of the pan. If you cut not ticking one yard long you can turn it up at each end and form pockets for slipping in the hot ware handling pans.

These cloths make good shower gifts, and can be beautified by stitching the folded length in a diamond pattern and either binding the edges in a contrasting color or buttonhole stitching them.

JEWELRY NOVELTIES

Rhinestone trimmed evening frocks and slippers have brought out a decided change in jewelry. The woman who once boasted that she would never wear anything but diamonds, and would wear no jewelry at all if she could not get those, is now selecting rhinestone pins, bracelets and even necklaces with great discrimination.

Wide bands of glittering, sparkling rhinestones are all the rage for bracelets. No one wears a single bracelet. They either come in bands united by a silver treatment or the one wears three or four narrow circles.

Oxys or enamel is often skillfully combined with these rhinestone bracelets and rings. Black enamel is especially effective for the dinner ring. Frequently rings and bracelets match just as the ear rings and necklaces of a few seasons back.

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
