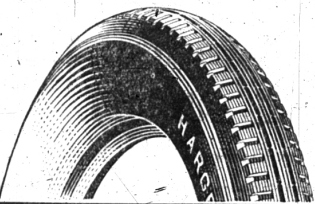

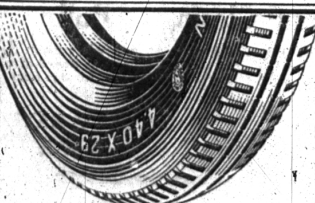

The Other Chap Says Something

THE FRONT DOOR Three months left, and \$180,000 to go. Failure means a rude awakening from the dream of a building for University women like the union for the men. For the Alumnae council must have a million dollars on hand in June of this year in order to meet requirements of the board of regents.

It has been a most difficult and trying ordeal to raise the \$500,000 now pledged, but those who worked were inspired by the vision, which lay just around the corner, of a fine task completed. None who has worked in the campaign begrudges the effort and time that have been devoted to the cause. But supposing there should be failure, and the past achievement of no avail—

Such a thought must not be entertained, of course. The Women's League building is too important an undertaking to be allowed to meet defeat. Just around the corner lies success, only a little farther to go and the goal is won.

But the University women have reached their limit, both in energy and financial ability to pledge further funds. There must be reinforcements, and they are sending out an appeal. Residents of Ann Arbor and the state at large are asked to support the cause.

The appeal is justified under the circumstances. Think what the League building will mean, not only to women students and alumnae but to their friends, and to the parents of prospective students. Children not yet born will enjoy the benefits of such a structure. And it will offer real benefits more than one way.

Consider merely the moral influence on the student body. Here will be a special center for the girls. They will not be outcasts as at present, with no place which all of them can call "home." They will have at their convenience a fine structure to which they may gain entrance via the front door, a structure that will be a tribute to Michigan's womanhood.

Women are obliged to enter and leave the Union by means of side doors. Perhaps that is right and proper, for the Union is for men and the men require a place of their own. But there is something almost tragical in the thought that egress is denied a front-door gathering place at Michigan. The Union belongs to the men, but how about a place for the women?

The people of Michigan ought to be interested, because the building will be located in a central place, as well as the sons of Michigan are rather important items in citizenship as well as family circles. Their welfare must be considered, and a social center cannot, therefore, be denied them. As for Ann Arbor, the people of this community should be doubly interested, because the building will be located here, and it will help parents to

decide that Michigan is the right place for their daughters, and likewise Ann Arbor women are more or less closely related to coal and alumnae activities. The campaign must not be permitted to collapse for want of a mere \$150,000—more, if the situation of which the League building is an important feature is given its due consideration. A front door for the women of Michigan? If Michigan folk will think of that phrase not merely in its physical sense, but with sympathy for its significance as well, the goal is no longer around a corner but within convenient reach. IS THERE A PRIVILEGED CRIMINAL CLASS.

It has seemed, from the great mass of special pleading interposed by those who insist that the methods quite commonly employed in the detection and apprehension of criminals in general should not be employed in the establishing the guilt of those who violate the prohibition law, that the impression is in some way being gained that there is, at least in the United States, a privileged criminal class, whose members are exempt from any obligation to observe, as others are expected to do, the laws of the land. This immunity is urged in behalf of those who make no secret of their desire to evade the law, who accomplish, by whatever means they choose to employ, the nullification of the law forbidding the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages. Their sympathizers have not yet seen fit to advise and urge the nullification of all law. This, logically, might be seen as the next step.

In those states in which prohibition enactments, either constitutional or statutory, were in force before the advent of national prohibition, sheriffs and policemen, as well as revenue agents employed by the Federal Government, were seldom criticized or condemned, even by those not entirely in sympathy with the law, for employing the most effective and drastic methods in bringing offenders to justice. That was before lawbreaking had come to be looked upon as a cunning subtlety in a device of so-called personal liberty. Parents of boys and girls soon to enter college or business, merchants, manufacturers, lawyers, teachers, doctors, and even editors, applauded and encouraged, especially in dry territory, fearless public servants who made it their first duty to apprehend and bring to court those who, without and persistently violated this particular law. Juries made it their business to convict those thus accused upon a proper and convincing showing of guilt, and judges sentenced those found guilty.

Strangely enough, as the record shows, in some of the jurisdictions where lawbreaking was once frowned upon as a breach of the social code as well, it is now not infrequently urged that those who offend against the prohibition law should not be made to fall under the disfavour of the arbiters of the law, and that the ordinary processes and methods employed in apprehending and punishing violators of other laws should not be permitted to be used against them. If there were only a few isolated cases in which this immunity is urged it might be regarded as a matter of little or no importance. But when it is attempted to extend the questionable rule to the patrons of lawless resorts, notorious night clubs, and even to so-called respectable public and private banquets and dinners where contraband liquor is served and paid for by hosts and guests in open defiance of the law, a perilous experiment is undertaken. (Christian Science Monitor.)

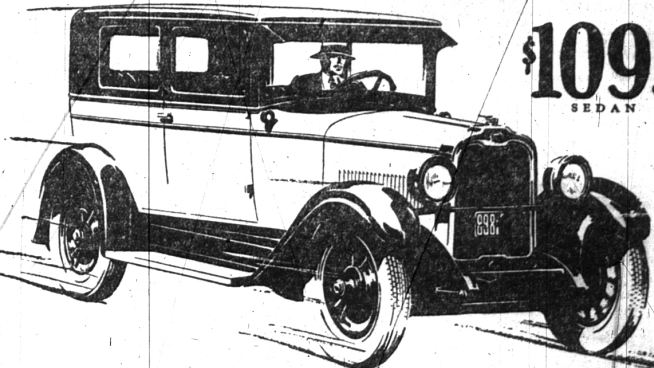
