RECORDS FALL IN INTERCLASS MEET

Eight New Marks Established in Baldwin Gym Thursday

Many school records tumbled in the interclass track meet, which was won by the seniors who had 53.5 points, last Thursday afternoon, in the Baldwin gymnasium. The freshmen were a close second with 31.5 points, the juniors followed with 29 points and the sophomores closed, followed with 26. Eight new marks were established when the final event was run. Clark broke his own pole vault record when he cleared the bar at nine feet after defeating his opponents at a lower height.

The high jump record of five feet six inches was held and broken by Gault, now Natus at one-inch higher. Waterman added 14 inches to his broad jump record when he made a leap of 18 feet 11 inches.
