HOLD PANCAKE FEED AT CLUB

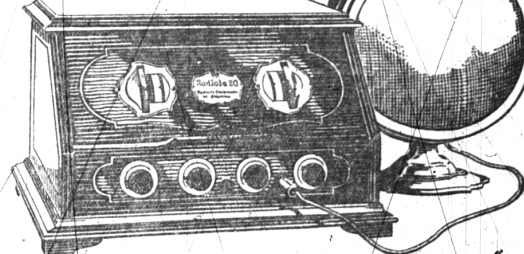
