TAXPAYERS MUST PRESENT UNITED FRONT, SAYS DOELLE

(Continued from Page 1, Part 4) value." He cited Lincoln as one of the greatest examples of success and closed his speech with a plea to unite for success.

Mr. Doelle, who spoke second, in addition to his explanation of the aims of the tax economy league and its purpose of bettering poor economic conditions, stated the principles of true economy which may not call for the saving of money, but often the wise spending of them. Mr. Doelle cited facts proving that national taxes under the administration of president Coolidge have decidedly increased but on the contrary, Michigan taxes have shown a rise. He said "One of Michigan's greatest assets is the tourists who seek the beautiful nature spots of northern Michigan for vacations, a gasoline tax from the tourists alone amounted to \$250,000,000 this last year. There is no doubt that every one, including realtors, is greatly benefited by non-residents of the state. Furthermore, there are many counties in the north whose taxes will not support them, and therefore they are a burden to

the state. The counties have no resources, either timber or other, so why couldn't this tax which is an expense to every taxpayer be made into a revenue source for non-tourists and vacationists, yielding a revenue rather than a detriment to the state. Tax economy league were organized to act in the line of the situation. Nathan W. Hill, president of the association, said in explanation, "The main object of the league is to promote industry and economy in the use of public funds. Little complaint has been placed on the question of the total amount of taxes levied and spent annually. However, the people are not given a definite percentage of public expense. It is not realized a growing and increasing state budget is the result of the expansion of government activities."

In conclusion, Mr. Doelle stated that the St. Lawrence water way project, which has been long in the air for almost thirty years, is the greatest project that looks towards its development to the benefit of a good sign for professional Michigan.

Donald E. Edwards, chairman of the entertainment committee, made arrangements for the play.

Many business men of the city were present as the chief of individual board members.
