TEACHERS RECEIVE INCREASE IN SALARY

(Continued From Page 1.) discussed by the board. To complete the discussion of the correct salary advancement, James W. Parry made the move for the scale which the board adopted.

"The set scale used by some schools are unjust. A teacher should be valued for ability which is manifest here as well as for experience taking a position in Birmingham," said Superintendent Clarence Vliet.

The board agreed with Leigh Lynch who stated Lewis Nicholson for rating teachers should judge the teacher for ability and initiative which may be readily determined by the principal. "We should pay our teachers for what they did in Birmingham rather than what they accomplished somewhere else," concluded Mr. Lynch.

Mr. Vliet cited a compiled summary of the maximum and minimum salaries, the rates, and increases for last year including schools of Birmingham, Detroit, Highland Park, Pontiac, Ferndale and Royal Oak, Birmingham, according to figures which he read, stands very well in comparison of the other cities, most of which are larger in population.

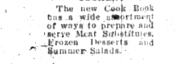
It was decided that those teachers who could not achieve a minimum increase and receive a standing of A or B in capability would be dropped if necessary.

The Board of Education now employs about 85 instructors, approximately 30 of whom are at the school business manager. Thirty-three of these are at the high school. Addition of one or two teachers for Adams school is expected.
