Another example is the Junior College in Highland Park, Michigan, who have this past year sponsored such a movement. Since the adoption of uniform dress, the number of invitations to school girls has been greatly reduced.

Her distracted mother is at her wit's end, trying to solve the problem, relatives are being called upon to assist in completing her wardrobe. Last year I heard one of the senior girls who planned to go to Washington say,

It has been reported that some colleges will not permit one to dress extravagantly. They also had their snik hose, rouge and picture hats. Business quines are often judged by the taste one uses in dress. In other words let your clothes speak for you and tell us, tell us as well as morally. Do not wear some style because some one else wears it, for in doing so you take a chance of being misunderstood. Through dress we can be known as extravagant, walking fashion-plate, conceited, trifling, empty-headed, delusive, senseless or we may be called worthy of the highest attainments, command respect of considerate people, and have our influence felt and appreciated by those seeing them. This is in various places of the business, teachers in school, and in offices, the managers have chosen a superintendent to set a rule for the kind of dress admitted as suitable for their school. This has been done by the J. L. Hudson company of Detroit, Marshall Field and company of Chicago, and many others. This is raising the morale in the office help and better work it has done so. If business men who are observing for their best results find help in dress reform, why do we not do so? The reason that better work could be done in school if there was simplicity in dress?

Teachers should also observe simpler dress. They may even adopt the wearing of smocks or some other suitable style of dress, but at any rate their clothing should be simple, inexpensive and becoming. Pupils have told me that they prefer to see their teachers wear dresses not elaborate or noticeable. One boy wrote, "I believe that teachers in school should not over-dress but should at all times be neat looking and should wear things suitable for their work. Teachers as you know, are looked up to by students and such being the case, they should be an example worth looking up to."

The teacher should not use too much make-up for it teaches the pupil to do so. I am told that in Pontiac High School teachers are advised not to use rouge. I believe there are no offending teachers in our building. A group of girls here in high school were asked how they would like uniform dress. The majority questioned welcomed the idea enthusiastically, while others felt it would carry the aspect of an orphan asylum. This "institution atmosphere" could be eliminated by wearing not a uniform, but uniform dress, to which might be added personal touches to retain individualism. A few of the reasons given by the girls for uniform dress were: "those girls who carry their own clothes would not have such a heavy burden," (2) this would eliminate the idea of one girl trying to out do her neighbor, (3) generally, a more pleasing appearance would result, since this would do away with out-of-keeping styles and cosmetic make-up.

On reading and filing the Bill of Complaint duly filed in said cause and the affidavit of Clinton McGee, from which it satisfactorily appears to the Court that the defendants above named, or their undersigned heirs, devisees, legatees and assigns, are necessary and proper parties in the above entitled cause and: It is further appearing that after diligent search, inquiry and investigation it cannot be ascertained, and it is not known whether the persons named in said Bill of Complaint as defendants, or any of them, are living or dead or where he, she or they may reside if living, or whether the right, title, interest, claim, lien or possible right has been by them, or any of them, assigned to any person or persons, and if dead, whether he, she or they have personal representatives or heirs living or where they or some or any of them may reside, or whether such title, interest, claim, lien or possible right has been disposed of by will and further, that the present whereabouts of each person, their heirs-at-law, personal representatives, devisees, legatees and assigns, are unknown and the Post Office address of none of them can be ascertained, nor can it be ascertained whether any of them are minors or incompetent, nor can the names of the persons who are included as defendants therein, being out being named, but who are embraced therein under the title unknown heirs, be ascertained after diligent search and inquiry.

On motion of Felton and McGee, attorneys for plaintiff: It is ordered that the appearance of each and all the foregoing defendants be entered in this cause within three months from the date of this Order, and in case of their appearance, on the appearance of any of them, that they cause their Answer to the Bill of Complaint to be filed and a copy served upon the attorneys for plaintiff: within fifteen days after service upon them, or their

attorneys, of a copy of said Bill, and in default thereof that said Bill be taken as confessed by the said defendants who shall fail to comply with the requirements of this Order.

It is further ordered that the said defendants cause this Order to be published within forty days in the Birmingham Economic Review, a newspaper published and circulating in said County of Oakland, Michigan, and in such newspaper or newspapers, or that plaintiffs cause a copy of this Order to be published, or served upon each of said defendants herein, at least twenty days before the time prescribed for his, her or their appearance.

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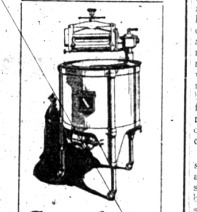
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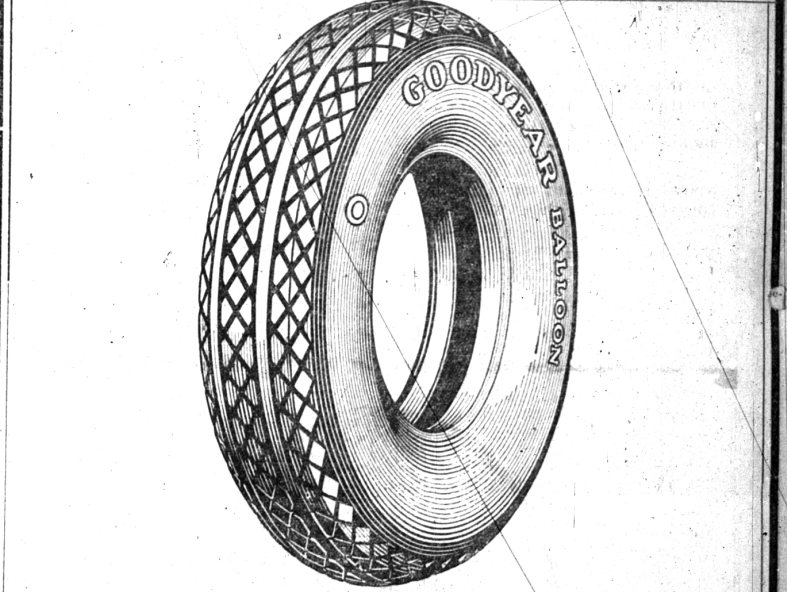
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
