2ND LIBERTY LOAN BONDS TO BE PAID

Steps Taken To Inform All Holders Of Arrangements
WASHINGTON, D. C., May 9.—Secretary Mellon has called for payment on November 15, 1927, all outstanding Second Liberty Loan bonds. Interest on these bonds will cease on November 15, 1927. Approximately \$1,700,000,000 of these bonds are now outstanding.
While the bonds will be paid on November 15, 1927, it is quite probable that during the next six months the Treasury will extend to the holders of the Second Liberty Loan bonds an opportunity to exchange them for other Government securities. No announcement has as yet been made as to the type of security to be offered in exchange, or the date when the exchange offer may be expected. The Treasury explains that the terms of the bonds require that a notice be given to the public six months in advance of the redemption date. The Treasury announcement, therefore, does not mean that the bonds will be paid at the present time, but merely places the holders on notice that their bonds will be redeemed on November 15, and will cease to bear interest on that date.
If holders of Second Liberty bonds desire to have their bonds redeemed, they should present them for payment on November 15, 1927, but if they desire other Government securities in place of their bonds, they should watch for further announcement and notify their banks to keep them informed of any exchange offering that may later be made by the Treasury.
In 1917 and 1918, it will be recalled, when the Government was selling bonds of the several Liberty Loans, a nationwide campaign was conducted, every available facility being used to reach the public and sell the bonds. The situation is now practically reversed, and the Government is preparing to redeem or exchange some of these bonds. While no such nationwide campaign is contemplated for the redemption notice as was undertaken in 1917, the Treasury nevertheless is making a special effort to inform the holders of Second Liberty Loan bonds that their bonds will cease to bear interest on November 15th. Banks and trust companies throughout the country will be asked to cooperate with the Government in spreading the news of this call for redemption, and in advising the holders of bonds that the Government is a means of reaching millions of bondholders. An announcement will shortly be broadcast from the larger radio stations of the country.
The importance of acquainting bondholders with the fact that their bonds have been called for payment is emphasized by the Treasury's records of previous calls for redemption or exchange. These records show that there are still outstanding at the present time, in the hands of the public, about \$14,000,000 in Government securities upon which interest has ceased. Included in this amount are \$7,000,000 in Victory notes which ceased to bear interest in 1922 and 1923. There are also outstanding \$14,000,000 in temporary bonds of the several Liberty Loans, to which were attached only a limited number of interest coupons. The last coupons matured some seven years ago. The holders of these temporary bonds have neglected to exchange them for permanent bonds having the full number of interest coupons attached, and until such time as they are made they have no means of collecting the interest. In the face of these facts, the Treasury is especially anxious that the present announcement reach as many Second Liberty Loan bondholders as it is possible to reach through the press, the radio and the banks of the country.

Oakland County Child Health Day Seen By Many As Successful

Success of May Day, Child Health Day in Oakland County is attested today, according to officials, by the fact that 1800 children were examined at the eight clinics.
The clinics were held at Rochester, Holly, Farmington, Milford, Orion, Clarkston, South Lyon and Walled Lake under the direction of Dr. John Munro, Oakland County Health director and Dr. V. K. Volk, deputy director of health. County Health Department nurse, was supervisor of the nurses.
From 125 to 400 children were examined at each clinic by both a medical doctor and a dentist.
Examination Only
The clinics were held for examination only, and in all cases where physical or dental defects were found the case was referred to the family physician.
A complete examination for kidney condition, anemia, thyroid gland, tonsils, mouth breathing, enlargement of cervical glands, heart and lungs, weight and height was made and in addition rural school children were given a vision test.
A complete dental examination was also made by the waiting dentist.
Results Encouraging
"In the great majority of cases," Dr. Munro said this morning, "the children were found to be in excellent health, proving that the health condition of the county in general, among the pre-school age children is very good. In a few cases, however, various defects were found including about 12 cases where a complete examination for tuberculosis is advisable."
The Health Department officials were assisted with the registration work at each clinic by high school teachers and pupils.

Teacher Plays Part In Sports
Ann Arbor, May 9.—Up on a shady corner of Hill street, in Ann Arbor, lives a retired professor who can claim what is probably the longest continuous period of athletic service to the University of Michigan. Thomas C. Truhead is his name and, after 50 years as a teacher, he is now taking life "easy," writing text-books and spending his leisure coaching the Michigan golf team.
Back a half-century ago, Truhead came to Ann Arbor as a young instructor and had hardly found himself a place to room when he had organized the faculty basketball team, which he served as captain, director, coach, manager and player. When the faculty now won't practicing or in action, Instructor Truhead could have been found out of the Varsity diamond, helping to share the undergraduate team.
After a decade at baseball, Dr. Truhead shifted his affections to the tennis court and for many years distinguished himself as an able player and coach. When advancing years began to make themselves felt, he "took up golf" and has never laid it down. For the past 20 years, his allegiance to the University has taken two forms: one in the classroom, and another on the golf course.
Dr. Truhead is now director of golf at Michigan and principal teacher of the game. He is assisted by Carlton Wells, former State amateur title holder.
