Two trackmen of Baldwin High School placed in the 100 yard dash of Michigan interscholastic track and field meet held at Ann Arbor last Friday and Saturday. They are David Gaffil, who took second in the high jump, and George Williams, who tied for third with two other jumpers, in the same event.

Five men accompanied Coach A. L. Van Winkle to Ann Arbor. Besides those named, Milton Thomson, Frederick Cox and Carl Hilly are included.

More than 300 boys representing 30 schools of Michigan and several of Chicago and Toledo, took part in the meet which was won by Detroit Northwestern. The preliminaries began on Friday afternoon and the finals were run off the following morning at Ferry Field.

Cox and Hilly, half-mile, failed to place in the event. Thomson who ran the 220 yard low hurdles took third in his heat but only two were qualified to enter the semi-finals.
