Coach A. L. Van Winkle's team pitted against Fensdale and Royal Oak in class B in the meet which included schools of B, C, and D.

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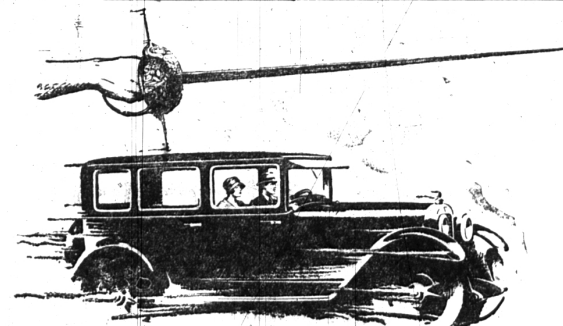

White trackmen who entered the contest qualified for the meet. Birmingham won the trophy and the relay cup.

To win Birmingham accumulated seven first places, four second places, eight third, and three fourth places. Fensdale was the only opponent who dangerously threatened, but a lead established early in the contest brought Birmingham out on top.

Fensdale took five of the major honors and Royal Oak, two.

Those of Baldwin who stood high in points are: Lyone, Gaffil, Thomson and Kamin. Each won at least one event, besides placing in others. Gaffil was the only man who scored two firsts. These were in the pole vault and the high jump, in which he tied with Williams. Lyone, pulled off the 220 yard dash in 24 seconds. Zaid passed first mile and out-stepped the field, winning with 1:54 as his time. Gaffil and Williams won the high jump easily at 5 feet 6 inches. Gaffil pulled a surprise in the pole vault and cleared in the air 10 feet, his best record. Kamin, heaved the shot to the mark of 38 feet 1 inch.

The relay team, Doherty, Thomson, Kamin, and Lyone, whose chances were somewhat doubtful, stepped out and led the 880 yards of sprinting with the time of 1:10.

Many Take Second

Those who got second positions for Baldwin include: Lyone, in the 100 yard dash; De Brie, the 440; Cox, the 880; and Kamin, the discus throw. Third places went to Doherty in the 100; Doherty, the 220; Kamin, the 440; Billy, the 880; Waterman, the broad jump; Kamin, the shot; Gaffil, the high hurdles; and Thomson, high hurdles. Cox got a fourth in the high jump. Waterman, a fourth in the javelin and Williams tied for fourth in the pole vault with two Royal Oak and one Fensdale trackmen.

Frank Healy, interested in many school activities, announces his intention of taking a business course in Detroit and also studying in Europe.

Bennett Brown, a star athlete and four letter man, who will graduate next January, "I hope to enroll in the William and Mary College after graduation but my plans are not definitely made."

Harry Bradley, well known as a Senior, will take up a three year course at the Detroit Business Institute. He will study accounting and will work for a master's degree similar to those granted by colleges.

Mildred Green, class valedictorian and pianist is planning to attend the Business Institute in Pontiac. She will attend mornings, she says, and study music in the afternoon.

3 NEW TEACHERS PASSED BY BOARD

School Directors Make Plans For Coming Fall Semesters

Three more new teachers for next year in the Birmingham Schools were approved by the school board on the recommendation of Clarence Vliet, superintendent of schools, at the board meeting last Thursday night.

For the first time, the board of the Baldwin High School, which had expected to go to Hazel to teach, was retained at the Adams School.

Mr. Tarrant will take the place left vacant by Francis Conko, who will be junior high school principal at the Adams School next year. He will teach biology. Mr. Tarrant, whose home is at 209 Piquette street, Royal Oak, has a state teachers' certificate. He is receiving his bachelor of science degree this June from Alma College.

Mr. Vliet was also authorized by the school board to hire a full-time instructor for orchestra and band work next year. The first year there has been a separate teacher two days a week for band and orchestra training, and it is believed Mr. Vliet has expressed his doubt, however, of being able to find such an instructor. "If a man is good at orchestra work, he is likely to be not so good at band work, and vice versa. We want one who is efficient at both. Our orchestra has come along splendidly this year and our band has a good start, and we would very much like to keep up the good work," he said.
