Leland Bunyan Named President of Baptist Church Organization

Leland Bunyan was elected president of the Baptist Community Brotherhood at the organization dinner and meeting Tuesday night in the church. Other officers named are: Levi Dean, vice-president; Ralph Wilson, secretary; and Percy Burnette treasurer.

Organized by Rev. Roy Oak pastor, in the role of principal speaker, outlined the purpose of the organization to the 83 members who crowded the dining room of the church to capacity.

"The Brotherhood is designed to promote comradeship among Christians," the speaker said "its purpose is both social and spiritual. It aims to develop the spiritual side of man as well as to foster the spirit of friendliness."

The next meeting and dinner is planned for early in December. The dinners will follow once each month after that. The services of the church to the community are to be obtained as features of the meetings.
