TRIBUTE PAID TO MOTHERS ARMISTICE DAY

(Continued from Page 1) sees a solution to problems of this nature through the schools.

"I always feel that I should not be speaking at an Armistice Day program, but that that honor should be given to one of the Gold Star Mothers of whom we hear too little," said Rev. Forsyth. "They gave not only all they had, but all they hoped for. A mother's life becomes that of her children. With those who think this a day for celebration and rejoicing I differ. I thank God that this is the anniversary of the doing away with war, but the joy is lost in my heartache."

"You children are happy in school at your work, expecting nothing to happen and I sit next to my friends when I was in school. But now they are dead. You will read many people are now reading about the World War, and you will read what has been written about the World War. They will tell you that we fought the war for commercial and economic gains, because we were forced to fight. But today does not celebrate the perverted principles of a few, but it magnifies and glorifies the principles of eternal justice to weaker nations and lesser people. The American Legion has every right to discount in any way literature that says we fought the war for dollars and cents."

"Do not confuse war with hands. I can remember when I like war. I thought it meant hands and I had visions of my sweetheart waving good-by to her boys as they went out to slay the foe. But war is not like that. It is dirt, filthy stench, blood, buzzards, cross and death."

Fought For Others
"Then why do people fight. Some for one reason and some for another. Thank God we can truthfully say that this nation fought not for personal gain, but that the weaker nations might have an equal opportunity in the family of nations. If war is needed to settle such disputes, it will be eternally justified. Peace is not a gift, but a treasure won by right thinking upon high levels from which you can not be bribed."

"If you would do something for the constitution of the United States and the book, the State and the Nation, written by the late Senator Albert J. Beveridge. Become interested in your government, your flag and your nation. They are not an indistinct story when you die they can say that you fought well, you gave all, for glorious wars, and women bore ever bore arms, and women bore sons. We owe an everlasting debt to the American Legion which will not be paid until you are willing to make the same sacrifice."

"The World War was a war against war, yet in spite of that, there are many adults and children who think that the United States are 'back in the war,'" said Rev. Evans to the audience at the Adams school. "This idea does not make for world peace. To accomplish this peace, we will have to begin an education for it within the schools. The real mission of the United States is to promote peace throughout the world, but this cannot be done until we have instilled the idea in the youth of the country. The schools have a true task to perform in the education for peace."

"Although we agree that war is a terrible thing, there are ideals involved in it," said Rev. Evans. "We should take time to look back over the past year to see if we have accomplished any thing towards the realization of these ideals. It is through the encouragement received from aiding the Red Cross and Near East Relief, the United States has not taken a drop of blood from any man who are in a position to take an unbiased view, that if the nations of the world do not take a more genuine view towards world peace another war will be the result."

"Psychologists tell us that hate creates a poison in the system of the individual which causes all sorts of evil results. This same thing is true of nations. Because of the hate in war, a poison has been created in the body of society. This is seen in the spread of vice and crime."

"The erection of a monument is not enough to create a permanent good. We must begin in the public schools and through education instill ideas of peace. Then only will the observance of Armistice Day be justified."

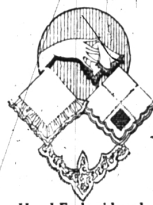
