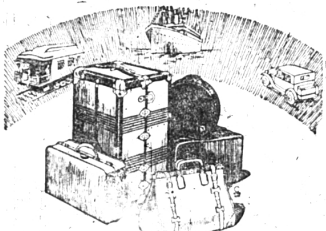

RECEIVES BIDS**

Plan Construction of Water Main; To Construct Tank.

(Special to The Eccentric) Royal Oak, Nov. 14.—Bids on the construction of the 46-inch water main from the Eight Mile road to the Ten Mile road were received by the city commission tonight and referred to the city engineers for tabulation and a recommendation. The bids to be brought in at next week's meeting. Bids were also received on the construction of the foundation for the million and a half gallon water tank to be erected at Woodward and the Ten Mile road. These bids are also to be tabulated at next week's meeting.

**CHILDREN'S FUND  
REACHES \$952.00**

David Ladd Aids For Completion Of Local Membership Campaign

With \$952.00 already collected from 219 memberships in the Oakland County Chapter of the Michigan Society for Crippled Children, David Ladd, in charge of the Birmingham quota of \$2,500.00, has sounded a plea for the completion of the annual Thanksgiving campaign to be hastened to an early close.

"Returns to date are most encouraging," said Mr. Ladd today. "The work for crippled children is a most worthy one, and its response from local and nearby people promises that our campaign will be a successful one. A good part of Birmingham has been covered to date, but there still remains much to do. We want to close this year's campaign before Thanksgiving Day, and will do so if all of those who have tendered their services will complete their tasks."

A Start Creation of the Michigan Crippled Children commission by the last legislature was only a start toward solution of the crippled child problem in Michigan, according to a statement issued here by Hugh E. Van de Walker, chairman of the commission and president of the Michigan Society for Crippled Children.

"Although a law recognizing the crippled children problem in Michigan has been passed, and the Michigan Crippled Children commission created to supervise the work throughout the state, the work of the Michigan Society for Crippled Children is more important today than ever before," he declared.

"It will be a wonderful thing for the crippled children of Michigan if the Thanksgiving Enrollment which is now in progress, increases the membership of the society."

"The work of the commission is just beginning. It goes slowly of necessity, because we have to find our way so that we won't do anything wrong that we will have to undo. But we do want the chapters of the Michigan Society for Crippled Children to carry on with us. We want them back of us in our appeal to the next legislature."

"Local Chapters Valuable for the work and making the preliminary arrangements of the new year," Mr. Van de Walker said, "the chapters are still counties in which no progress has been made."

"While there will be nothing spectacular about it, the work is going forward in all parts of the state quietly and effectively, and I hope that every person in the state who is at all interested in crippled children will give it cordial support in the Thanksgiving Enrollment."

Everyone in Michigan may be a member of the Michigan Society for Crippled Children. Dues are one dollar a year.

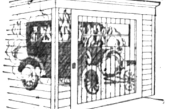


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**MILK BOTTLE ROUTES
