VILLAGER'S KIN DIES IN WEST

Brother Of Miss Frances Skinner Is Victim Of Heart Trouble

WAS NOTED ENGINEER

Word has been received here of the death last week at Grand Junction, Col., of Walter Sowers Skinner, brother of Miss Frances Skinner, of Henrietta street.

Mr. Skinner who was 65 years old has been prominent in engineering work in the United States for 30 years. As a member of the Ontario Power company, he developed the first power house at the base of Horsehoe Falls, at Niagara, in 1897, thus enabling power from the falls to be transported to Syracuse, N. Y.

Although details of his death have not been forthcoming, it is understood that Mr. Skinner died suddenly, of heart trouble. Funeral services and burial were expected by relatives in Michigan to take place in Colorado, where Mr. Skinner had been for some time.

Among his other well-known engineering feats was the building of the largest swimming pool in the world, at Colton, Cal. At the time of his death, he was connected with the State Oil company, at DeBeek, Cal.

TIMBER FACTORY IN NEW TOWN

Upper Peninsula Community Is Transformed Into Attractive Place By Use Of Lumber

BLANEY, Mich., Nov. 15.—When the virgin timber supply was exhausted by lumber and logging operations, conducted for a number of years by the Wisconsin Land & Lumber Company of Bemungville, Wis., this town became merely a ugly blot on the landscape.

An important question then arose of how best to utilize the cut-over lands so that they become a real asset to the entire state of Michigan, and especially to this part of the upper peninsula.

After exhaustive research and study, the idea was conceived to establish a resort that would be entirely different from the usual resort proposition. Blaney Park Resort, which was recently dedicated to the public, was the result of this idea. The 22,000 acres immediately adjacent to this point now presents to the passing tourist, and to the more permanent visitor a scene of beauty and attractiveness unequalled anywhere in the northern country.

As the motorist speeds into sight of Blaney on either of two of the many beautiful roads that traverse the upper peninsula he finds a handsome commodious hotel; clean, attractive looking cottages and lawns, a complete water system and in the distance a lovely little lake. A splendid nine-hole golf course is being laid out by a professional golf engineer and in the background is a forest of mixed hardwood and pine that affords the lovers of nature every facility for exploring the woods and enjoying the trees, the birds, the game and the wild flowers.

THE DAYBOOK OF A NEW YORKER

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—Add to the many mournful plights of New Yorkers, this pathetic story. A poor family of the east side recently lost two children, when the latter were trapped in a tenement fire. Now the two babies are in the morgue and they will be buried in Potter's field unless the parents can raise enough money for an orthodox burial. And as things appear now, the parents will not be able to secure the required amount. That, it seems to me, is a tragedy which can only be found in a city as large as this one.

There is a ragged rump who haunts the imposing front of Roxy's theater. He stands back most of the time, upbraiding the crowd. But when a taxi draws up, he dashes forth to open the door—invariably, getting there ahead of the uniformed starter. He also usually gets a tip, which the starter is not allowed to take on pain of dismissal. And it is not unlikely that that is why the starter is always late in getting there. It would not surprise me to learn that he got a rake-off from the urchin.

The arrangement of streets at the Barclay street ferry must appear, to flat-footedness, as a deliberate trap. Now motorists, coming off the ferry, naturally head up Barclay street. But as this happens to be a west bound one-way street, nine times out of ten, the visitors are nabbed by the traffic cop at Broadway. True, the small arrow on a lampost at the river end, pointing westward. But to one who is not abnormally observant, this direction would never appear. After all there is no reason, usually, why Barclay street should be open only to westward traffic. It seems to be an arbitrary arrangement that will incur a deal of ill-will toward the city.
