CROOKS ROAD OPENS TODAY

Completes Road Building Program Of Oakland County For Year

SUMMARY IS GIVEN

(Special to The Eccentric) Royal Oak, Nov. 14.—The new Crooks road was to be opened to traffic today.

The new Crooks road improvement is 11 1/2 miles long, running north from Royal Oak city through three townships, Royal Oak, Troy and Avon, to the Dodge road. It provides a new all-paved route between Royal Oak and Pontiac.

The opening of Crooks road marks an important milestone in an unprecedented road building program in Oakland county for 1927.

The new roads include 50.1 miles of concrete, a gain of 13 1/2 miles over last year and 34 1/2 miles of gravel surfaced roads, 12.8 more than 1926.

Twelve-mile road, extending seven miles from the Southfield road through Southfield and Farmington townships to the Orchard Lake pavement, opened September 1.

Four-mile road, running seven and one-half miles from the Southfield pavement, one half mile west of the Orchard Lake pavement, through Southfield and Farmington townships, opened November 1.

Campbell road, running four miles from the Eight-mile road to the Twelve-mile road on the east side of Ferndale and Royal Oak, opened June 1.

Petitions for the condemnation of portions of four plots in Royal Oak township were filed in Circuit Court Monday by the Detroit Grand Haven & Milwaukee Division of the Grand Trunk railroad. It is stated that additional land is required by the railroad for increasing its yard facilities at Royal Oak. It also needs room for classification yards, an engine house, water, cooling and car repairing facilities and a yard office.
