DEMOCRACY IS ON TRIAL 'SAYS DR. STEVENS

(Continued from Page 1) the idea, it was simply a sifting of matters.

"The aristocratic government was not wiped out of Europe. It was changed into the hands of the capitalists who were despots in every way. The workers were forced to live and work under the most terrible conditions. The American negroes were never in as terrible conditions.

"In the nineteenth century, the idea of democracy was best expressed in the writing of constitutions. All the South American countries adopted them, fashioned after ours. But they found that a constitution was not a self-starter. In our own country, we found that the vote did not help the slave, but gave them power which they would not control. As a result Washington disfranchised itself rather than submit to these votes. That is the only example in his-

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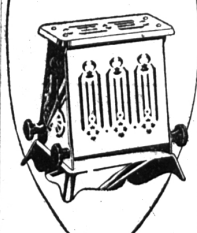
No Foolin' By Frank E. Sternal
