Auburn Heights.—Mrs. Conrad Kohn, 329 Osman street, and a friend, Mrs. Vincent of Auburn Heights, were slightly injured Wednesday afternoon when their automobile was forced from the pavement on Auburn road into a gun-trail. The automobile was wrecked.

Pontiac.—The Pontiac Rotary club at its regular weekly meeting on Wednesday voted to appropriate \$1,000 from the treasury for the establishment of a Rotary Student Loan fund, to be used in helping deserving high school graduates of this city to continue their education in college.

Grand Rapids.—Refusal by the Association of Commerce and the Grand Rapids Flying Club to give the United Airways, Inc. of Detroit, a license for a Detroit-Grand Rapids route has placed an obstacle in the way of the proposed air mail service to Detroit and Toledo.

PONTIAC.—The interstate commerce commission hearing on the Pere Marquette railroad's proposal to lay 17 miles of track between Wilcox and Pontiac, link it up with other connections and place Pontiac on a new Buffalo-to-Chicago main line, will be held in Detroit December 1. It was announced yesterday. The railroad application for permission to proceed with the improvement, which also calls for a belt line at Pontiac, designed to be of service to the city's future development, was filed on September 27.

 building up rapidly with homes. It lies between Mt. Clemens road and South boulevard and extends two miles east of the new eastern limits.

Includes Yellow Plant To the south the petitioners draw an irregular line as Pontiac's proposed new south boundary, being at Pontiac's southwest corner near Pontiac drive and the Michigan Air Line right of way, thence to Orchard Lake avenue and then following the Square Lake road to Square Lake. From that point it runs south into the lake and then east crossing the proposed Telegraph road and following the Fisher avenue. From Franklin road, from Franklin road a line is drawn across to the D. G. H. & M. railroad west of Woodward avenue which misses Bloomfield and East Bloomfield Highways.

The line then follows the D. G. H. & M. right of way to the Square Lake road and then continues east until it intersects a line drawn south from South boulevard along the east side of the E. P. Hammond property. This area includes the Ward Orchard subdivision, considerable unplatted property north and east of Square Lake, the extensive area the South Park Development company plans to plat to model subdivisions east and south of the present city. But chief of all it takes in all the property occupied by the new Yellow Truck & Coach Manufacturing Co.

Area Building Up Fast Due to the location of the new Yellow Truck & Coach Manufacturing company's plant near Pontiac, the areas east and south of the present Pontiac limits are building up rapidly and another year is expected to bring even greater development. Because of this growth school facilities are taxed to the utmost and Auburn Heights and other school districts are beginning to feel the school taxation. It is pointed out that these areas can be taken care of in much better shape by becoming part of the city.
