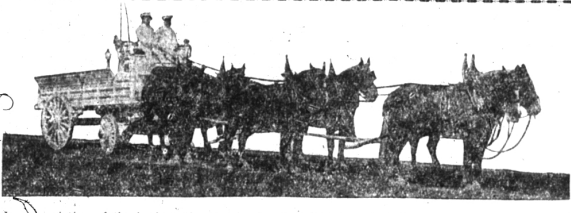


**SCOUT TO GET MEDAL FOR SAVING LIFE**

In appreciation of the business which his company has built up in a few months, L. M. Murphy, manager of the Birmingham branch of the Pontiac Dairy company has

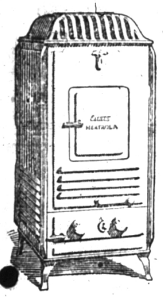

**FERDLE MAY HAVE NEW MARKET**

Open Air Mart Discussed By Officials of Southern City.

Ferdale, Nov. 17.—Ferdale probably will have an open air market next spring, to be open on alternate days from the market at Royal Oak, which was opened during the past summer and which has met with marked success. If the open air market here proves a success, a permanent building probably will be erected.  
A. L. Bell, superintendent of markets for Oakland County, met yesterday with Mayor Guy W. Stark and a committee appointed by the Ferdale city commission at which the decision was reached. It is estimated that the market can be opened with an outlay of but \$500, to be used in securing a base on the site for a year and also for erecting the necessary tables and for providing an enclosed office building.

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**PARADE IN OAK FOR NEW THEATER**

Royal Merchants To Celebrate Dedication of Kunsky House.  
Royal Oak, Nov. 18.—Merchants of this city have entered a score in the Progress Night parade, which is to proceed over all of the principal streets here Friday night. The parade is to follow the dedication of the new Kunsky-Royal Oak theater located in the new Washington Square building at Fourth street and Washington avenue.  
The theater walls are up and the roof has been completed. The ventilating system is now being installed. Work on the main portion of the building is nearly completed, and it is expected that the negotiators will be put to work within the next few weeks. The building is six stories high at the corner, with two-story sections running back along Fourth street to Lafayette avenue, and along the new Washington Drive, northwest 200 feet, paralleling the D. C. R. interurban and Grand Trunk railroad tracks.

**Tree Trimmer Makes Rescue**

Royal Oak, Nov. 17.—Squawking back and forth with each chilly blast of wind Thursday afternoon, high on the topmost limbs of a 75-foot maple tree at 1032 North Pleasant avenue, was a tiny kitten, which weakly with each succeeding minute.  
Citizens, taking pity on the feline, called the police department, who in turn notified the fire department. Lieut. Ray and Firemen Frank Winters and Wallace Collins answered the call, with hook and ladder, raising it to its fullest height.  
But the ladder was too heavy for the tiny branches at the top and the firemen were unable to reach the kitten, which, in the meantime was growing weaker and weaker from its long vigil high in the air.  
After a half hour of tireless, but unsuccessful effort, the firemen were ready to give up the task.  
Then onto the scene came Claude Porter of Orchard Lake drive, a professional tree trimmer for the Detroit Edison company.  
Jump, and Porter was shipping his way up the smooth trunk. There—he had caught the lower branches and soon was nearing the upper branches. With a last reach into the air, coupled with an enticing call of "Come, kitty," Porter caught the kitten in his hand and gingerly lowered himself to the ground, where he was greeted with a shout of glee from a score of kiddies who had gathered to watch the rescue.
