**DROPS DEAD
 PLAYING GOLF**

**Johnson Tells
 Boy Scout Aims**

Official Of Michigan Alkali Works Is Apoplexy Victim
 While he was playing golf at the Oakland Hills Country Club last Thursday afternoon, Wilton Crowl, for the past 11 years, traffic manager at the Michigan Alkali Works at Wyandotte, dropped dead of apoplexy. Coroner Earl Goddon, of Pontiac, was called in and confirmed the cause of death. Mr. Crowl was 55 years of age and lived at 1633 Longfellow avenue, Detroit.

Mr. Crowl's companions had left him at the sixth hole, in the south end, and when he didn't catch up with them in a few minutes, went back to look for him. They found him lying on the ground, dead. Born and brought up in Chicago, Mr. Crowl was for 10 years employed by the Michigan Central railroad before he became connected with the Alkali Works. He was vice president of the Wyandotte Terminal railroad at that time. He has been married and was a member of the D. A. C., the Traffic Club, the Detroit Rotary and the Commercial and the Island Country Club, Palestine Lodge P. & A. M. and of the Shrine.

Besides his widow, Mrs. Theresa Crowl, he leaves a daughter, Mrs. Irene Crowl, and a sister, Miss Carrie Crowl, of Chicago. Funeral services were held at 2 P. M. Monday from his Detroit home, under the direction of the Masonic lodge. Burial was in Ascenia Park cemetery.

**JOHNSON TELLS
 BOY SCOUT AIMS**

Therein lies the need of the present day and generation. I have in this country in general, and more especially in this community, all of those essential factors required for the rearing of a race of super-men, who shall make that past performance fade into insignificance, who can make the past history of this country but a prelude to a more glorious future of accomplishment.

But there is one ever-present danger in our modern scheme of living. We have available religious training of a quality never before achieved in any age, but we have available in schools of a quality unknown in previous times. We have physical training of a quality never known in the history of our race. But there is no more powerful catalytic agency for the crystallization of these various forms of training into terms of character, than contact with emergency over and over again, of the forces of nature in their elemental forms. In plain, unadorned, English, the ever-present danger of our modern generation becoming too soft, too unresponsive to the natural and well-balanced life are not what they were in earlier days. The opportunities to lead a natural and unbalanced life are many. My point can probably be made to you in a few minutes by reading the following verse by Hamilton Garland:

Do you fear the force of the
 wind, the flash of the rain?
 Go face them and fight them.
 Be savage again,
 Go meet the duties of your
 life; go wade like the crane;
 The skin of your hands will
 thicken;
 The skin of your chest will
 harden;
 You'll grow rugged and weary
 and swarthy,
 But you'll still like a man,
 Hiking, camping, woodcraft,
 pioneering, knot tying, fire
 friction, fire by flint and steel,
 first aid, life saving,
 cooking, forestry—do these Scout
 activities have any added significance to you?

I think I can hear someone say
 to himself, "But he don't
 need to come here and argue with
 me to convince us that the Boy
 Scout organization is a good
 thing. We know it. We haven't
 helped to sponsor a troop!"

For Future
 I am not trying to sell Rotary or
 the idea of Scouting being a
 good thing for the boys, one which
 the organization should approve
 and aid. I am trying to convince
 each Rotarian, pledged to community
 service, that Scouting has
 within it the possibility of being
 a vital force in this community,
 now and for 50 years to come.

I am trying to arouse the personal
 interest of the individual
 member of this organization to the
 point that he will volunteer a personal
 service to Scouting. Personal
 interest has far more vitalizing
 influence than that evidence
 by the resolutions of organizations.
 How many of you have ever
 visited, or in any other manner
 manifested any interest in the
 Scout work of the Boy Scouts of
 America? How many of you have
 ever tried to learn how you could be of service
 — even though your time be limited?

Scouts of Birmingham. It is not doing as well as it should.

There are many men with particular interest in and knowledge of particular subjects, who could be of great assistance in qualifying as instructors and examiners in scout badges work.

I like to recall a scene in connection with the three day summer camp at Walnut Lake, last June which will live long in the memories of those present. A grassy slope, a lake in the foreground, a beautiful forest in the background, throwing into strong relief the gleaming white of a cluster of tents on the hill-top. Over all, the meditative, peaceful quiet of a summer's Sunday twilight. In the center of the picture a circle of interested, animated faces—lighted by the dying rays of the sun and the growing light of the campfire—listening to the eloquent, forceful words of one who talked their language, telling them of the Great Scoutmaster and their relation to him. Your own fellow-Rotarian, Rev. Robert M. Atkins made a real sacrifice to do that thing. But who shall say that it was not well worth while?

President Talks
 More recently, at the fall rally there occurred a very graceful and gratifying thing. No one can question that the duties of village president added to those of a man's sized job in his daily work are apt to usurp most of a man's spare moments. When, in spite of this fact, the village president (as he has) leaves a commission meeting for 15 minutes to make a talk to the Scouts on their part in the community life, their duties to Birmingham, such an act makes a very definite impression upon impressionable boyish minds. It constitutes a very real influence for good in the community.

Lloyd L. Stanley, Birmingham district commissioner, gives an estimate of his time, thought, and energy to the welfare of scouting. He is, more than any other one man, entitled to the gratitude of this community for the degree of success which has been attained in scout activities, for the high rank which the Birmingham troops hold among those communities which comprise the Detroit area.

His only reward is the satisfaction of knowing, through years of association with, and service in

counting that his sacrifice is in a doing which is well worth while.

When a man interrupts his vacation, drives some 50 miles or more back to Birmingham—and spends a day arranging a dinner for a Boy Scout rally, he is doing more than merely making good on a job. He is doing more than keeping faith with the boys. He is displaying a very real spirit of sacrifice for community service. Dr. Fred L. Tucker is such a man.

When two busy business men, such as Jay Washburn and Donald James, not only proffer the use of a beautiful piece of property for camping purposes, but take a personal interest in the selection of the best site on that property for a camp, they are doing more than simply a favor to the boys. They are rendering service to Birmingham.

I might multiply such instances indefinitely, but why do I? I have mentioned but a few in order to indicate the wide variety of ways in which you men of Birmingham can be behind the Scouts. Knowledge of the spirit of Rotary and of the spirit of Rotarians. I know nothing more is needed to enlist your personal interest and cooperation.

The need exists, the opportunity is open. The spirit and inclination to serve are not lacking. There remains but the application. Birmingham will then have done its bit toward raising such boys that this nation need not fear for its future.
