Badwin rounces Ferndale 13-0

Through the passing and running of Roderick Cox, fullback, Birmingham was able to down the Ferndale football warriors last Friday at Barnum field by a score of 13-0. Roger Brown netting 33 yards, and with five yards to go the stake was set for the first score. Cox took to two line plunges carried off by the Birmingham team. A three yard kick missed by inches of the goal post.

Following this incident the two teams settled down to an evenly matched game, stellar play being shown at times by both the visitors and the village team. The contest appeared ragged and plays, usually functioning well for Birmingham were broken up on a Ferndale defense. Losses were frequent for both Ferndale and the villagers. Many times tackles were made behind the line of scrimmage.

Second Goal Scored
The second touchdown was made shortly before the contest's conclusion. Birmingham resumed fighting tactics shown earlier in the game when Cooney caught a punt from Huff and ran it back to the Ferndale 21 yard line. A steady march on short gains was made from here until a pass from Cox over the goal line to Herman Schwartz, quarterback, gaining 14 yards, blocked. This pass was partially blocked by two Ferndale players, Green and Froedberg, but Schwartz snatched the ball before it touched the ground and plunged over the goal line. Root, placekicker, kicked the extra point with no difficulty.

The longest run of the contest was made by Cox, in the first period, on one of the few times the interference functioned. He circled the end, advancing 47 yards. Records show that Birmingham having made nine first downs to Lincoln's three. Total ground gained by the Baldwin team was approximately 123 yards while Ferndale gains tallied 89 yards. If the numerous penalties and losses were subtracted from the ground gained by the local team, the yardage would be cut down considerably. Fitch's three passes to Green and Krouse gained 58 yards, but out of nine attempted, three were intercepted while the interceptors were in scoring territory. Cox passed three times, two of which were completed to Brown

and H. Schwarze, totalling 47 yards.
Ferndale did not demonstrate its usual caliber of play, seeming unable to get started. This was also true of the Maroon and White, the line was broken through numerous times and the plays were haphazard.
Capt. Philip Henry and Arthur Otis performed well in the forward wall of the Birmingham team. Henry smashed through the line time and again to smear plays. He also made tackles on many other occasions.

Krouse, at fullback, was the star in the visitor's lineup. He was responsible for the failure of many opposing plays and also carried the ball with great success making his longest rush during the first 10 yards. Captain Fitch showed creditable performance and forward passes with some success.

Quarterback Schwarze and Right End Huff of Ferndale were the two who matched punts during the game. The local man's punting was none too good early in the game but greatly improved later. Huff punted about equally with Schwarze, directing most of his outside to gram full distance.

Nearly Scores
In a fair way, Ferndale left end, snatched a fumble in the fourth period and leading gallantly down a clear field for a touchdown, after snatching 33 yards, Cooney the only man near him managed to stop the threatened scoring.

Only in the first and last quarters did Birmingham show merit. The fourth quarter witnessed the most consistent play of the game. Gaining was steady and at one time, Cooney made runs of 20 and 25 yards in succession. One was held for holding, Donald Gore, substitute fullback, almost scored directly before the final gun, clearing 23 yards through the line.
