CHIEF WARNS IN FIRE WEEK

Inspections had been made, soot cleaned out and the necessary repairs were put into operation in the fall.

The use of oils and gasoline can be made safely only by exercising care in handling them. They cause an annual fire loss of more than \$10,000,000 in property because of carelessness or ignorance use. Many lives are lost through using kerosene or gasoline to start fires in stoves and furnaces. This is a most dangerous practice. Only mops and brushes should be used to clean up accidental combustion. They should therefore, be kept in closed metal containers where a cannot reach them.

Should Inspect Wiring
When repairs are installed and used there is no safer form of light, heat and power than electricity. But due chiefly to carelessness the annual fire loss attributed to electricity is more than \$15,000,000. All wiring and electrical apparatus should be carefully inspected by skilled workmen and frequently inspected.

Disorder and untidiness breed fire. Careful attention should be given by the householder to the removal of all rubbish from the collars, attic and cupboards. Light bulbs should be properly disposed of. In 1925 matches and smoking were responsible for \$30,000,000 fire loss.

with a line to Chicago. Eventually, he said, the company expects to extend its line to New York via Pittsburgh and Philadelphia. The line is not included on the line to date, Mr. Potter stated, but he declared that if Pontiac wants to be on the line it can do so if it will provide the right of way. No money would be necessary, he added.

Committee Named
The county was provided with a written lease giving the company the right to maintain its line on the Eight Mile road. It agrees to give the county an indemnity bond of \$100,000 protecting it against any damage that might result from the operation of the line.

of knowing why they were doing things. He quoted John Dewey thus: "to try to find a way to make a child want to do a thing must be a part of every reasonable effort to improve our schools."

"The P. T. A. should help blaze a way and make a contribution to meet the situations which develop," he said.

"Galileo was the first person to challenge an old concept by demonstration, and he proved that many of the older teachings of Aristotle were erroneous, although up until that time they had been considered infallible. We should test the things that touch our own lives. Originality has been taboo. Nevertheless we ought to develop the capacities of the child in judgment and independence."

Especially in the preschool period does Dr. Willard consider it desirable to develop individuality and clear thinking. The main

"Those who have reconstituted this fact, however," he said, "have accomplished it in the fact of what is generally taught by the churches. Therefore we are going to have reason to reconstitute the church itself. If we do not grow with our children, can they get their best growth and can we enjoy them?"

"Our process of education is complicated by a lack of tasks carrying responsibility," Dr. Willard concluded. "Here is where the P. T. A. can help, always keeping in mind that each child should be made a clear-thinking, independent, responsible individual, and one who can at the same time fit into his proper place in the social order of life."
