ADAMS TO START SCHOOL PAPER

First Issue Of The Booster To Appear In Weekly Staff List

Next Thursday will mark the appearance of the first copy of the Adams "Booster," the official organ of the Adams Junior High School. It will go to press Wednesday.

A one or two-page paper, it is composed, typewritten, and photographed entirely by Adams students, and contains the names of the Adams school alone. The name, chosen by Richard Ellerby, of the 2nd grade, was picked from a large number of names submitted by the school's freshman class.

An office out of the art room has been chosen, where the editor and managing editor will have desks, and where the files will be kept and all material coming in to the desks and going to press will be cared for.

The editorial staff has been picked for the first semester, but for the second semester and the remainder of its life, a new staff will be chosen each month. The first semester's publishing corps is as follows: Stoddard White, editor-in-chief; Nancy Johnson, managing editor; Edwin Deer, sports editor; Leonard McClure, art editor; Joe Hinshaw, boys' organization editor; Frances Murray, girls' organization editor. IMMORTALS SAID TO BE AGELESS

Strictly speaking, those who are immortal have no age. Nevertheless, the Immortals of the French Academy are still amenable to the calendar, though some of them seem to defy its limitations. The forty are, in fact, a venerable company. One of the latest members, M. Paul Valery, is remarked upon for his youth, though he is past 60, and the only younger man is Robert de Flers, who is 55. The Dean of the Immortals, though he has never formally taken his seat among them, is Clemenceau, who is 86. But he is not the only octogenarian, for Jules Chambion is 82 and Pierre de la Gorce is 81. Georges de Portoriche and Albert Besnard are 78. Marshal Foch is 76; Paul Bourget and "Papa" Joffe are 75, a year older than Rene Bazin and Gabriel Hanotaux, while Francois de Curel and Marshal Lyautey are 73. Camille Picard is 71, and the roll of septuagenarians is completed by Charles A. Jonart, 70.

There follow Eugene Brédy, who is 69; Monsignor Baudrillard, Henri Bergson, Pierre de Nolhac; Maurice Donnay, Henri Emile Lavedan and Camille Jullian, who are 68; Rene Daumic and Raymond Poincare, who are 67; Louis Barthou, Marcel Prevost and Edouard Estaunie, who are 65; Mme. Henri-Robert is 64; Louis Chevillon, Joseph Beilier and Henri de Regnier are 63. The Abbe Bremond, 62, completes the list of octogenarians. The Duc de la Force, Georges Goyau and Henry Bordeaux are under 60.

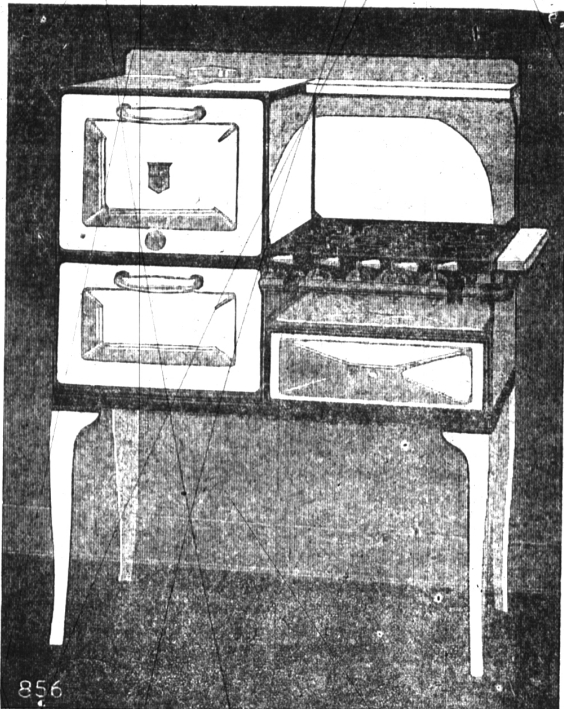
