## REVISE PLANS FOR HIGHWAY

Owners To Meet Again With Commission In Two Weeks

A revised plan for the proposed cutting of a thoroughfare from Pierce street to Woodward avenue between West Maple and Brown is in the hands of property owners directly affected today as they may consider the issue before meeting again a week from next Monday night with the village commission.

The new plan was submitted by J. J. Hunter of Bloomfield Hill Village whose Birmingham property would be involved in the new thoroughfare. Mr. Hunter told commissioners he thought the first plan submitted was inadequate because it would benefit but a few of the property owners. He declared also that the new street would be a menace to the safety of pedestrians, especially school children, if approved as it was planned.

President H. T. Ellerby said that the project would probably cost \$100,000. This, he declared, would be shared according to the following tentative plan: directly affected property owners would pay three-sixths, benefited property owners in the neighborhood, one-sixth, the village at large, one-sixth.

He explained that this is quite tentative and constitutes merely a possible rate of assessment should the project be agreed upon.

## TROY BUILDING IN FORMAL OPENING

Program Is Probable At Dedication Of New Township Structure

Formal opening of the new Troy Township hall, at 440 West Maple and Troy roads will be held Saturday, Nov. 12, it is announced today. The ceremonies will begin at 3 p. m. and last until 9 that evening. Although no details are yet ready, it is expected that a program will be given.

The new hall, which has been open a month, houses all the township offices, and provides a court and jail. A dance hall is on the second floor which will be used for township affairs.

The high light of the new building is the treasure room, which is a part of old Troy. Its door is made of a barn door, 102 years old, the lumber for which was cut in Troy. It contains a fire place and old fashioned oven, and a number of treasures have been donated by residents of long standing in Troy, to make the room a reminder of the pioneers of the township. The hall also boasts two dedicatory tablets, one to the war heroes and one to the pioneers.

An artificial lake is being built at the west side of the hall, which may be used for skating in the winter time.

Commissioner W. W. Henry protested when it was said the facilities were not all they should be. Mr. Henry owned the property originally and still holds considerable of it.

"The village wanted me to bring two subdivisions inside its limits and has persecuted me ever since," he said bitterly. Mr. Stoll also told the commission that there is no fire protection for the court because of a lack of water facilities. He also said that drinking water was taken from a 1,000 gallon tank and he had been in fear lest the water stagnate.

Several sample signs have been received by the manager and they will be selected with regard to economy and design, he said.

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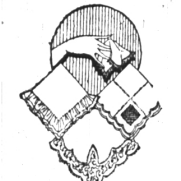

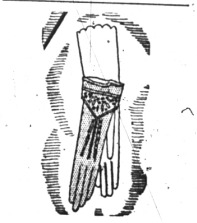
