Literary Women Study New Cranbrook School Tuesday

Mrs. Edward L. McColgin of the Detroit City Federation of Women clubs gave an interesting description of the Cranbrook development at the meeting of the Women's Literary club, Tuesday afternoon at the Community House. She was introduced by Mrs. M. Curtis Stamford, chairman for the day.

"I believe this work of art that George G. Booth has created is an expression of himself, that will live on and will be a monument worthy of his great effort," she said.

She described in their turn, the grounds, the houses, the church and school, and one room in the architect's building. She told of Mr. Booth's hopes and aspirations for another Cranbrook, a reproduction here in Michigan of the Old Cranbrook in the grounds in England. The name was derived from the old crane that made their home an artistic group. The house is purely Elizabethan in architecture and is filled with priceless treasures, but a comfortable and homelike, nevertheless.

An Education

The class, which is very poorly completed, Mr. Booth has named for St. Dunstan whom he admired for his wonderful old hand printing, an art Mr. Booth has studied and mastered himself, she said.

"The school is an education in itself," Mrs. McColgin said, "and the students will see being created into the decorations of their school by the printed pages of schoolbooks."

The one room in the architect's building that Mrs. McColgin described is a little museum of figures and carvings of every description, (waiting to be put in their places at the proper time. Photographs of many of the views of the estate, were on display after the meeting adjourned.
