While he was sawing wood in the yard of his home on the Fourteen Mile road, Bethune A. Bigelow, 65 years old native of Bloomfield, dropped dead of heart disease Oct. 12. Although he had been in failing health for several months, Mr. Bigelow was active. Members of his family found his body on the ground near his house.

HOW to Achieve Beauty
