Ypsi High Swamped By Baldwin Gridders, 43-0

Exhibiting their best brand of football displayed so far this season, Coach George Johnson's gridders romped away with seven touchdowns against Ypsilanti Central high school on the Ypsi-Norfolk field last Friday. The final score was 43-0 in Baldwin's favor.

The first score of the encounter White had kicked off in the second quarter. The advance, unblocked by the line at one time besides numerous smaller gains, and Cox gained steadily by rushing the line.

Otis thrilled the spectators when soon after the Maroon and White had kicked off in the second quarter, he intercepted a pass and galloped 45 yards to register the fourth score against the Maize and Blue.

Thompson, who entered the game when Brown, injured by a score which Brown, right end, snatched over the heads of several opponents, shook off a tackler, and sprinted 20 yards to the goal line. Conroy was second to score, breaking loose early in the second quarter and running 24 yards around end to the line. Birmingham steadily pushed the ball into scoring territory through a series of passes on the last play of the first quarter from Cox to Left End R. Schwaize, for 20 yards, by which the offensive gains by Conroy and a 15 yard penalty on the home team.

Cox's bowery star, the third tally, was furnished by Cox, who after assisting in a yard, H. Schwaize followed with a six yard gain and then on the next play heaved a pass to Brown, which added 20 yards. Gore who replaced Cox, made small gains. Conroy again took the oval and ploughed 14 yards through a point, which he kicked to a point, two yards from the goal line, which Doherty bridged on the next play.

Quarterback Schwaize played the leading part in the final scoring of the game after Ypsi had tried an aerial attack, failed, and finally was forced to punt. Schwaize slanted off tackle into a clear field to gain 22 yards, short of the goal line. After Gore had gained four yards in two plays, Schwaize again took the ball, scoring on the second attempt, and talling the seventh touch-down.

R. Root, who dependably passed the ball from the goal line, played a large share in making the line a success, was able to place the ball for a first down on several touch-downs, but had other attempts blocked. Root's recovery of a Ypsi fumble gave Birmingham the chance to record the fifth touch-down by Thompson.

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ELIGIBILITY RULES GIVEN

Athletic Board Adopts Mandates For School Sports

The athletic board in control of Junior High athletics in Birmingham has announced a set of eligibility rules which will govern boys' and girls' athletic contests. Hereafter any student, regardless of his or her academic standing, was permitted to play. This was regarded as unfair to other students, and the following four rules, which cover the situation completely, were agreed upon:

1.—Any member of a Junior High team who participates in any other similar school contest, shall be ineligible to participate in these rules for the remainder of the season. This rule excludes those boys of Junior High High athletic teams, who are in the following, a student must be taking at least one-half of his school work in a grade before he is eligible to participate in games as a representative of that grade.

2.—No student shall compete in any contest who does not have a passing grade from the beginning of the semester to the date of the contest in at least 75 per cent of the total units work carried.

3.—Beginning the second semester, a student must carry a passing grade to carry 75 per cent of his work for the preceding semester is ineligible to compete in Junior High school athletic contests.

The "Pine Cone" troop of the Girl Scouts of Birmingham are holding their meetings every Tuesday afternoon in the music room

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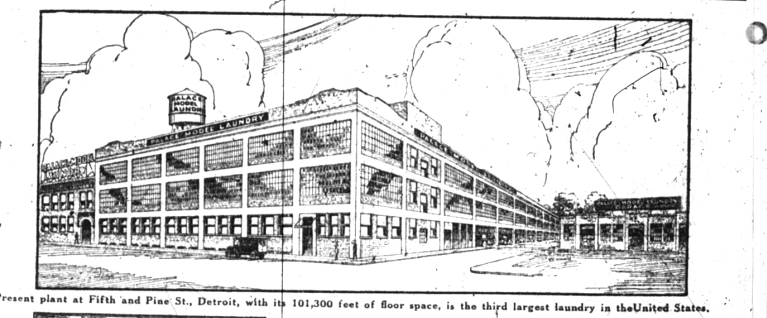
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
